

b. There were nine enemy initiated attacks for the month of July. This is a decrease of two-thirds of last month's total of twenty-seven. Enemy KIA's decreased from forty-four to twenty-one for the month of July.

c. On 2 July 69, the Scout Section from S-2 and the Hamlet Chief from Dong Son (2) (vic AT995675) entered the hamlet where the chief pointed out one dud M-79 round, and a beer can packed with C-4. The ordnance was blown and a VIP payment was made.

d. On 2 July 69, a platoon from Company A was checking out a possible PW site (vic AT970652) when they discovered 14 SFD's (five M-26 grenades rigged with tripwires and nine homemade devices packed with C-4 and shrapnel and rigged with pull friction fuzes). The SFD's were set in a 50 meter diameter in a tree line. A sign with the words "Cam Van" was found in the immediate area. Unit blew each SFD and the area was checked out thoroughly.

e. On 2 July 69, a squad from Company C discovered four SFD's rigged as a daisy chain while providing security for the road sweep along Route #1 (vic AT032632). The daisy chain which consisted of one 105 HE round with three M-26 grenades and tripwires was found emplaced at 15 foot intervals along an east-west trail.

The SFD's were blown and the area was checked out thoroughly.

f. On 7 July 69, a platoon from Company D while checking out the village of Dong Tien (3) (vic BT025613) spotted five NVA in uniform. An alarm was sounded from within the village and the NVA fired five shots and retreated south of the river. The unit took the enemy under fire with small arms and called in artillery. Area was checked out thoroughly and a team from 3rd CIT was called to screen all villagers. Two women were detained, but later released.

g. On 10 July 69, a squad from Company D was searching an area (vic BT024610) when they sighted four NVA in green uniforms and with weapons moving along the south bank of the river. Unit fired small arms and M-79, resulting in two NVA KIA.

h. On 22 July 69, a platoon from Company A found 37 bunkers and 55 fighting holes evenly dispersed over entire area (vic AT970566). Area was honey combed with trails and gardens. The 12 foot elephant grass made detection from air virtually impossible. All bunkers and fighting holes were completely destroyed.

i. On 26 July 69, a platoon from Company A captured one VC in a tunnel (vic AT987605). Man had M-16 rifle with four magazines, three chicom grenades and assorted documents. Upon interrogation by S-2 personnel, man pointed out one SFD in the immediate area. SFD was blown and man was taken back to the rear for further disposition.

j. On 28 July 69, a Hoi Chanh identified a VC Hamlet Chief and pointed out 800 pounds of rice, and SFD factory, and a place where miscellaneous documents were hidden (vic AT983608). Rice and documents were evacuated to the rear as was the detainee.

3. <u>OPERATIONS AND TRAINING</u>	
A. <u>OPERATION</u>	

(1) MISSION. 1st Battalion, 1st Marines was assigned the mission to:

ENCLOSURE (1)

(a) Conduct deliberate, detailed searches to find, fix, capture, and/or destroy enemy forces (NVA/VC/VCI), harbor sites, supplies and fortifications in the "Dodge City" Area of Operations in conjunction with Phase IV of Operation PIPESTONE CANYON.

(b) Conduct unilateral, joint and combined offensive operations within the assigned TAOR to locate installations, with emphasis on those forces and bases which pose the greatest threat to RVN control of important population and economic centers and to the security of military installations.

(c) Deploy forces throughout the assigned TAOR to provide a defense of Danang area and military complex with emphasis on routes of approach to probable rocket/mortar launch positions, including waterways.

(d) Provide security for the Cau Do Bridge (vic AT998705) and the Ha Dong Bridge (vic AT996641) from 1 July 1969 to 20 July 1969.

(e) Locate and interdict routes of infiltration in the TAOR to include waterways.

(2) OPERATIONS

(a) On 1 July 69, Company B went under the operational control of the 1st Marine Division as Task Force Kilo, the mobile reactionary force, for the city of Danang.

(b) On 2 July 69, Company D conducted a cordon and search of the village of Tam Hanh (vic AT999654). A team from the 3rd CIT screened all civilians with negative findings.

(c) On 8 July 69, Company D conducted a cordon and search of the village of An Tu (1) (vic DT024636) in conjunction with a National Police Field Force unit and a team from the 3rd CIT. A total of five Vietnamese civilians were detained and taken to Dien Ban District Headquarters for interrogation.

(d) On 14 July 69, Company D went under the operational control of 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines for a period of 3 days to conduct operations in the "Dodge City" area in conjunction with Phase IV Operation PIPESTONE CANYON.

(e) From 21 - 24 July 69 and from 26 - 29 July 69, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines (-) (Rein) operated in southwestern and northwestern "Dodge City" conducting operations in conjunction with Phase IV Operation PIPESTONE CANYON.

(3) ARTILLERY

(a) During the month of July, Battery A, 1st Battalion, 11th Marine continued its mission in direct support of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines.

(b) In addition Batteries B & C, 1st Battalion, 11th Marines and Battery L, 11th Battalion, 11th Marines fired in support of 1st Battalion, 1st Marines' activities.

(c) During the month of July, there were 153 observed missions expending a total of 1554 rounds. There were also a total of 364 unobserved targets fired, expending 8,712 rounds. These targets were in the form of H & I's, preemptive fires, preffires, and TOT's, as well as intelligence targets.

(d) In order to provide maximum artillery support for Operation PIPESTONE CANYON, 1st Battalion, 11th Marines displaced Battery B to Go Noi Island and Battery C to Hill 55.

(4) AIR SUPPORT

(a) During the month of July, 10 sections of fixed wing from MAG 11, 12, and 13 flew in support of the 1st Battalion, 1st Marines. The aircraft expended a total of 33,000 pounds of bombs, 24,000 pounds of napalm, 3000 pods of 20mm ammunition, and four smoke cannisters. The only damage assessment figures available were 500 meters of treeline destroyed.

(b) G-130 Flareships supported 1st Battalion, 1st Marines with one hour on station dropping flares. OV-10 Bronco aircraft from VMO-02 amassed 25 hours of flight time with aerial observation, artillery spotting missions and close air support. The aircraft expended six pods of 2.75 rockets and 1500 rounds of 7.62 in close support. Four visual reconnaissance missions were flown during July with a total of two hours flight time.

(c) In support of combat operations in the 1st Battalion's TACR, 10 emergency, four priority, and four routine med-evac sorties were flown. There were also 12 trooplift sorties flown by CH-46 helicopters in support of the Battalion. Both the UH-1E and Cobra model Hueys expended a total of three rocket pods and 3000 rounds of 7.62mm ammunition while escorting the med-evac and troop lift missions.

4. LOGISTICS

a. During the month of July 1969, all sections under the cognizance of the Battalion S-4 functioned normally and efficiently with no unusual occurrences.

5. COMMUNICATIONS AND ELECTRONICS

a. During the month of July all sections in the Communications Platoon functioned normally and efficiently with no unusual occurrences.

6. PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS

A. PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS

(1) Psychological operations for the month of July included 31 regular leaflet drops with accompanying tape broadcasts. During the month Psyops have been stressed repeatedly through normal channels and through ARVN, RF, and PF units. Hand distributed leaflets totalled 22,000 for the month. The Battalion provided movies on five different occasions with a total showing time of four hours.

(2) During the month there were three Cordon and Search Operations in which the S-5 participated. There were also four Serious Incident Reports which required submission during July.

B. CIVIC ACTION

(1) Civic action projects for the month included the continuation of a pig project, the rebuilding of a school house, and an irrigation project for the people of Duong Son Hamlet.

(2) Supplies were distributed for the building of two hamlet meeting houses. Also enough wood, tin, and cement was distributed to complete 17 homes. These homes were in various hamlets throughout the GAAOR. Cement was also provided for the building of a Buddhist Pagoda.

(3) MEDCAPS treated a total of 1125 people. 280 pounds of soap were distributed during the MEDCAPS. Transportation was made available on four different occasions for the families of those miseducated civilians to visit them. A MEDCAP building is presently being constructed at the South Gate of the Western Combat Base and will be in use in the very near future.

C. TRAINING

SECRET

(1) A Vietnamese nurse is being trained to assist in all MEDCAPS. Once trained she will also be utilized to train other Vietnamese women in various sanitary and medical measures.

B. FACILITIES

a. The BAS consists of four huts, one small shed, and two metal-reinforced bunkers. The huts are utilized for sick call and treatment, sick wards, immunizations, health and dental records room, supply room, administration area, the laboratory, and as berthing spaces for officers and enlisted personnel. The small shed is for storing personal gear and effects.

C. DAILY ACTIVITIES

(1) Sick call is held from 0800-0900 and 1300-1400 daily. Sundays and holidays sick call hours are conducted from 0800-0900 only. Emergencies are seen anytime.

(2) A total of 558 patients were seen at sick call during July.

(3) Eight patients were referred to other medical facilities, two received physical examinations, 237 received laboratory tests, 54 were treated for skin disease (including jungle rot and immersion foot syndroms). There were 13 respiratory infections, 7 fever cases of undetermined origin, and 36 cases of venereal disease. There were no malaria cases this month and there were 22 cases of acute diarrhea.

(4) Immunization - a total of 850 immunizations were given this month.

(5) Transportation is provided for patients referred to other medical facilities. The BAS ambulance is used for emergency runs only. Medical evacuation helicopters are always called when time is of critical importance.

(6) Medical Civil Affairs Program - a total of 874 Vietnamese civilians were seen at the BAS sick call. Mobile MEDCAPS were conducted on an average of two to three times weekly to nearby hamlets and villages.

D. WEEKLY ACTIVITIES

(1) Sanitation inspections of various facilities within the Western Combat Base are conducted once a week or whenever necessary.
