1. In accordance with reference (a) the command chronology for December, 1966 is submitted.
2. Commanders narrative summary of significant events.
 - a. A provisional rifle company was formed and on 17 December 1966 the relief of A-1-1 was effected.
 - b. Personnel of this Battalion were the first on the scene when the plane crashed at (BT 012718). Rescue and clearing operations were co-ordinated by the 1st MP Battalion until relieved by Division G-5. This Battalion continued to provide security until the wreckage was removed.
 - c. Extensive day and night patrolling continued with a total of two-hundred and eight (208) fire team and one-thousand three-hundred and three (1303) squad size patrols, twenty-one (21) ambushes and sixty-nine (69) listening posts were initiated.
 - d. Six (6) confirmed VC were apprehended during the month of December.
 - e. Twenty (20) Air Force Sentry Dogs were introduced into our perimeter defense. These additional dogs greatly enhance our detection capability.
 - f. Civil affairs continued to be emphasized. Fifteen (15) English Classes were conducted and 13,542 patients were treated by our dispensaries.
 - g. Weapons safety continues to be emphasized at all levels of command.

SECTION III

INTELLIGENCE

1. SIGNIFICANT EVENTS. On 241915H a Flying Tiger Airline Transport plane crashed in Hoa Tho Village, Binh Thai Hamlet (BT 013718). Approximately 120 Vietnamese civilians were killed in the crash, a situation which the enemy could exploit. No VC Psy Ops effort has been detected to date.

2. NEW DEVELOPMENTS.

a. 5th CIT has been assigned the mission of supporting the 1st MP Bn TAOR.

b. S/Sgt Duong Nhu Long, ARVN interpreter, has been successful in developing several confidential informants in DaNang East. For his own reasons he has chosen to keep his sources confidential. His information has resulted in six confirmed VC captives on 30 and 31 Dec. He has also contributed several pieces of intelligence information of C and B reliability throughout late November and December. Very little information has proven inaccurate. S/Sgt Long has provided valuable information otherwise impossible to obtain. 5th CIT has been assisting and working with S/Sgt Long. For details on the pickup of the six VC see Section IV.

3. PROBLEM AREAS. The areas cited as containing VC sympathizers in the October and November Command Chronicles continue to be suspect.

4. INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY.

a. There were seventeen incidents of sniper fire within the 1st MP Bn TAOR during December, in comparison to eleven incidents during November.

b. From 210400H to 210700H a sweep was held in the hamlet of Binh Thai based on intelligence received that VC were infiltrating the village. Forty-one Marines, eighteen PPs, fifteen National Police and nine civilian militia swept the area bounded by the following coordinates: (BT 014717), (BT 013723), (BT 011718), and (BT 012722). Fifteen VCS were apprehended and turned over to Hoa Vang Headquarters.

c. Based on intelligence that the VC were sending women to DaNang to buy rice for the Marble Mt. area "B" Company checkpoint at coordinates (BT 058743) searched two Vietnamese buses going south at 220630H. Approximately 1500 lbs of rice were found on the buses. The rice and seven female VCS were taken to Hoa Vang District Headquarters. One woman, identified as the wife of a confirmed VC by "B" Company interpreter, was taken to ITT.

d. At 261330H two sailors guarding a dump at coordinates (BT 077718) tripped a booby trapped grenade. BOD was killed and found a mine under a board. Two USN WIA.

e. At 300010H the "B" Company checkpoint (BT 058741) picked up one female VCS based on information from their interpreter that the woman's husband is a VC. VCS taken to 5th CIT for questioning.

f. From 301830H till 302000H CAC "G" and Company "B" apprehended five VCS based on information developed by Company "B"'s ARVN interpreter and 5th CIT in the vicinity of An Thuong Hamlet (BT 048764). The five VCS were taken to ITT.

5. SPECIAL INTELLIGENCE REPORTS. All special reports were forwarded to III MAF and 1st Marine Division as appropriate.

6. PRISONER REPORT.

a. There were 17 VCS and/or suspicious persons apprehended and taken to Dong Giang District Headquarters, 11 to DaNang Garrison, 31 to Hoa Vang District, 4 to ITT and 2 to 5th CIT.

b. Six of the VCS taken to Hoa Vang District were confirmed as VC. The two VCS taken to CIT were wives of VC.

7. ENEMY CASUALTIES. None.

8. CAPTURED EQUIPMENT.

a. On 1 Dec CAC F-5 found one K bar, a M-14 bayonet and cartridge belt in a tunnel at (BT 043753).

b. On 21 Dec US Navy Road Patrol found one bandoleer of carbine ammo in DaNang East.

9. DESTROYED DEFENSES AND POSITIONS. CAC F-5 found and destroyed one tunnel on 1 Dec, (cf. par 8a).

10. INTELLIGENCE TRAINING. On 22 Dec a Section Chief was added to S-2 Section, already consisting of one officer and clerk. The marine filling this billet is performing OJT.

OPERATIONS & TRAINING

OPERATIONS

1. Summary. Security of the DaNang Air Field as the Air Base Defence Battalion is the primary mission of the 1st Military Police Battalion. A Company, D Company, and the Provisional Company (formed at 0800, 17 December 1966) provided security for the Air Field while B Company was responsible for East DaNang. The battalion's secondary mission is to provide military police for the Air Base, DaNang City, and East DaNang. C Company assumed this mission.

2. Small Unit Actions. During the month the Battalion conducted ninety-two (92) daytime and one-hundred sixteen (116) night time fire team patrols. Squad patrols numbered four-hundred seventy-eight (478) daytime and eight-hundred twenty-five (825) nighttime. Twenty-one (21) ambushes were conducted. Sixty-nine (69) listening posts were set out. No enemy contact was made.

TRAINING1. General.

A. General Military Subjects, technical and weapons training were stressed during the month. A quarterly training requirement SOP was published specifying the minimum hours required for each general military subject. It further required that each company spend a minimum of six (6) hours per week on general military subjects training. In addition each staff section and company office conducts technical training for all office personnel.

B. Seventy-one (71) personnel used the Hoa Cam Range for FAM firing the M-60, M-79 and .45 Caliber pistol and for obtaining battle sights for their M-14's.

C. Nineteen (19) people from the Battalion attended the Mine and Warfare and Booby Trap School given by the 3rd Engineer Battalion.

D. Seventy (70) personnel newly arrived in RVN were given an indoctrination lecture. This included the military situation, nature of the VC, the Vietnamese people, and health and hygiene.

1. At 010800 1st MB Bn provided sixty-six (66) personnel for an Honor Guard at III M.F.
 At 010900 an indoctrination lecture and instruction was given for newly arrived replacement personnel.
 At 011100H a patrol from CAC F-5 found a small (4' x 6') tunnel at coordinates BT 043753. One K-bar, one M-14 bayonet, one (1) cartridge belt and two (2) plastic hoses were found in the tunnel which was destroyed.
 From 012100H to 012330H, ten (10) Marines, CAC F-3, eight (8) National Police, one (1) Platoon of Popular Forces and one (1) platoon of Combat Police conducted a sweep coordinates BT 009779, BT 009782, BT 017782, and BT 017779. Six (6) VCS were apprehended and taken to DaNang Garrison.
4. At 041725H at BT 057743 one (1) VCS was apprehended by "B" Company at a checkpoint for having no papers or I.D. The VCS was taken to IIT.
 At 042100H a sniper fired into security bunker 8A at BT 048784. The post sent up a white flare and returned five (5) rounds small arms fire with negative results.
5. At 050900H 1st MB Bn provided sixty-six (66) personnel for an Honor Guard at III M.F.
 At 052145H a practice alert was held. The Reaction Platoon was requested in the "D" Company area. At 052152H the truck left the Bn area, at 052157H it arrived at the "D" Company area. Simulated penetration by VC Sapper Squad.
7. At 070325H snipers fired approximately twenty (20) rounds small arms fire at Navy sentries at coordinates BT 058767 (China Beach). Navy sentries returned fire and a CAC Golf patrol checked the area with negative results. No casualties.
8. At 080015H the I Corps POW camp at coordinates BT 079717 received an unknown number of rounds of small arms fire. The fire was returned and a patrol sent out to check the area with negative results. No casualties.

- 9 At 091915H an A-1-1 sentry at coordinates BT 004784 received three (3) rounds small arms fire. A VCS was apprehended and a CAC F-3 patrol took VCS (Bui Van Trai from DaNang) to the Civilian Police Headquarters near F-3 compound. VCS was carrying a flashlight and notebook when captured. A-1-1 will send out a patrol in morning to search for weapon. VCS will be taken to DaNang Garrison in the morning. No casualties.
- 10 At 100120H a sweep was completed by CAC Golf in the village of Nhuoc Truong at coordinates BT 055786. Three (3) women and two (2) men were apprehended as VCS and turned over to district headquarters.
- At 100800H nineteen (19) personnel were sent to Mine Warfare School.
- Twenty-five (25) personnel FAM fired at Hoa Cam Ranges.
- 11 At 110345H a Delta Company patrol at coordinates AT 998734 received two (2) grenades and small arms carbine fire from approximately four (4) VC. The patrol returned approximately fifty (50) rounds of small arms fire and a reaction force was dispatched to sweep the area. Negative results. Two (2) USMC KIA (minor).
- 12 At 120345H a grenade was thrown and exploded near a Delta Company post at coordinates BT 008734. A patrol swept the area and one (1) VCS was apprehended. The VCS was taken to ITT. No casualties.
- At 122000H an alert was given by the Bn C.O. The Reaction Platoon responded, arriving at gate 19 at 2016. C.O. again alerted reaction platoon to gate 6 at 2030. The platoon arrived at 2040. MSWG Security requested to report to MP Headquarters at 2040, arrived at 2108.
- 13 From 131730H to 131845H a sweep was conducted by D Company, CAC, and Vietnamese National Police to search for caves and tunnels in the area bounded by the following coordinates AT 997733, AT 999732, AT 998728, AT 999729. The sweep was initiated based on information received from a Vietnamese National that there were VC hiding in the above area. Negative results. No casualties.

- 13 Cont. At 132145H CAC G-2 discovered a Vietnamese body which had washed on to China Beach from the ocean at BT 059776. CAC G-2 notified the Tien Sha M attachment. The body was the remains of a priest from St Johns Seminary at BT 051759. The body was claimed by the Vietnamese.
- 15 At 150900H a Foxtrot 5 special patrol found illumination canister (U. S. Navy, Bn Wep, Flare Air Craft Para, Mk 24 MOD 3) at coordinates BT 043748. It was found placed in the ground partially filled with dirt and emplaced like a mortar at a 65° azimuth. It was blown up with a hand grenade and thrown in the river.
- At 150800H 1st M Bn provided sixty-six (66) personnel for an Honor Guard at III MIF.
- At 151420H Delta Company apprehended one (1) VCS at coordinates AT 997744. The VCS was identified by a Vietnamese as being one of the snipers who has harassed "D" Company for the past six (6) months. The VCS was taken to IPT.
- 16 At 162033H posts 16 and 17 at camp Tien Sha, coordinates BT 062820 received four (4) rounds small arms fire. Five (5) rounds of small arms fire were returned and a patrol checked the area with negative results. No casualties.
- At 162130H a MCB-5 post at coordinates BT 057738 received 5-6 rounds automatic small arms fire from the west. A patrol from CAC G-5 checked the area with negative results. No casualties.
- 17 At 170800H, Provisional Company, a newly formed element of 1st Military Police Bn relieved A Company, 1st Bn, 1st Marines in defense of Oscar Area, Airbase Defense Battalion.
- At 172203H, an MCB 6 vehicle going south (BT 052755) received one (1) round small arms fire. Action taken; fifteen (15) rounds returned, patrol sent to area with negative results. No casualties.
- 18 At 182140H a Camp Tien Sha post at coordinates BT 063823 received two-hundred (200) rounds small arms fire and two (2) grenades. The area was illuminated and small arms fire was returned. The Golf 2 reaction force and a Navy reaction force swept the area with negative results. No casualties.

At 190500H Golf 2, with National Police, Air Force, and Naval personnel swept the area from BT 095837 to BT 075825 for VC and personnel being in unauthorized areas. Five (5) female and three (3) male VCS were detained. They were taken to Police headquarters at Dong Giang where the males were confirmed as VC.

At 191745H a CAC F-6 IF reported that he saw four (4) VC in the vicinity of BT 015718. Foxtrot 6 sent special patrol of four (4) Marines and four (4) IF's. They apprehended one (1) VCS. The VCS was taken to Hoa Vang District Headquarters.

At 192115H an unknown number of Vietnamese cut and crawled under the wire at AT 999766 and uncoupled the fuel pipeline. A Can partially filled with fuel was found under the wire. The security section called the Navy who fixed the pipe and then a sentry dog post was established in this vicinity.

At BT 059776 At 200220H, security forces at the General's beach house saw movement to their front thought to be two (2) or more VC. Post 28 checked area and a reaction squad from III MAF moved through area with negative results.

From 200140H to 200400H Tien Sha received sporadic fire and two (2) grenades from BT 061824. The camp's security was put on alert and CAC G-2's reaction squad was called out at 200400H. The reaction force with Navy personnel blocked off and swept the area around the pagoda (BT 061824). One (1) female VCS was captured and turned over to 5th CIT who subsequently released her. USN took four (4) male VCS to National Police. EOD searched area for booby traps finding none. No casualties.

At 201035H the bunker at DaNang harbor entrance (BT 034-840) received sniper fire. They returned three (3) rounds M-79 at two (2) VC. The reaction squad from CAC G-2 swept the area with negative results. No casualties.

From 210400H to 210700H a sweep was held in the hamlet of Binh Thai based on intelligence received that VC were infiltrating the village. Forty-one (41) Marines, eighteen (18) PF's, fifteen (15) National Police and nine (9) civilian militia swept the area bounded by the following coordinates; BT 014717, BT 013723, BT 011718, BT 012722. Fifteen (15) VCS were apprehended and turned over to Hoa Vang Headquarters.

At 211540H one (1) round small arms fire from across the river went through a butler building at NS Hospital (Coordinates BT 062728). Division COC notified. No casualties.

- 21 Cont. At 211630H a Navy road patrol at coordinates BT 030840 apprehended four (4) VCS at deep water pier. They were turned over to CAC G-2 along with one (1) bandoleer of ammunition for a carbine and papers describing boats arriving and departing the pier. The VCS were taken to DaNang Garrison.
- At 212315H Elephant Beach IX (BT 0677) received three (3) rounds small arms fire from an unknown location. Search of the area revealed a hole in the wire indicating that the VC had entered there. Further search produced negative results.
- 22 At 220630H the "B" Company checkpoint at coordinates BT 059743 searched two (2) Vietnamese buses going south, based on intelligence received of the VC sending women to DaNang to buy rice and transporting it back to the Marble Mountain area. Approximately 1500 lbs of rice were found on the buses. The rice and seven (7) female VCS were taken to Hoa Vang District Headquarters. One (1) woman was taken to ITT based on her identification by the "B" Co. interpreter as the wife of a confirmed VC.
- 23 At 230050H Camp Tien Sha Security, post #10, received one (1) sniper round from the vicinity of the Temple. One (1) round returned. No casualties.
- At 230129H Camp Tien Sha Security, bunker #29, received one (1) round small arms fire from Tien Sha Village. No action taken and no casualties.
- 24 "A" Company sent twenty-seven (27) personnel to Hoa Cam Range for FAM firing of the .45 Cal. and M-60 MG on the 25 meter range. B Company sent twenty-one (21) personnel for FAM firing of the .50 Cal. MG and M-79.
- At 241300H CAC G-5 found one (1) male Vietnamese body floating in the water at BT 048737. The body had been dead for four (4) to five (5) days. One-half of the head had been severed from the body. No I.D. card or papers. The body was turned over to the Village Chief of Nuoc Nam for burial.

24 Cont. At 242030H the Naval Harbor Patrol Point and Security Post at Deep Water Pier reported receiving moderate small arms fire from BT 028843. Swift Boat was sent to provide 81mm illumination and support. Estimated time of arrival 242045H. Negative results. No casualties.

At approximately 241915H a Flying Tiger Airlines' transport plane crashed at coordinates BT 013718. A patrol from CAC F-6 was dispatched immediately and the Battalion ambulance was dispatched at approximately 241925H. The "A" Company reaction force was dispatched at 1935 and the H&S Company reaction force left the Battalion area at 1950. A two and one-half (2½) ton truck with stretchers and medics left the battalion area at 2010. Additional equipment was requested and dispatched including one (1) wrecker from Maintenance Company, FLSG, two (2) engineer ground lighting units from 1st Marine Air Wing and the Air Force, an ambulance from the Air Wing, and an MF traffic section. Additional help was requested from III M.F and 1st Division in the form of tents, cots, blankets, water, and civic action personnel and supplies. As of 242400H work on the excavation and further search for bodies continued with the H&S Company reaction platoon providing the security force. The wounded and dead Vietnamese were taken to Charlie Medical and USOM Hospital. Four (4) bodies were found in the cabin of the plane and an estimated one-hundred (100) Vietnamese were killed and twenty-five (25) injured. Further reports will be submitted as received.

CIVIL AFFAIRS

1. PRIMARY CIVIL AFFAIRS MISSION. In consonance with the Government of Vietnam's (GVN) Revolutionary Development Program, the 1st MP Bn's primary civil affairs mission is to assist the GVN in selling the people on the GVN and the merits of free government. To accomplish this mission the 1st MP Bn's primary CA objective is to rectify those conditions that led to and fostered the development of insurgency in the first place. Such conditions are caused by a weak government, resulting in deficiencies in government services. Because of lack of funds and skilled personnel, most war time governments are afflicted by deficiencies in public health, public works, education, welfare, etc. Where the war torn Vietnamese government is weak in our TAOR, we seek to strengthen it by offering sound advice, assisting where the GVN can not, and by physically working with the local people to show sincere interest in helping the Government and the people. Within the 1st MP Bn's TAOR such assistance has involved numerous incidents of advising local officials on supplies available through their channels, drawing their attention to needs for public works, technical assistance available, and public health needs. The advisory effort is this unit's most important work, for this is the best way of making the people and GVN help themselves. The advisory effort is the least impressive statistically and most frustrating operationally, but if performed with sound reasoning, patience, and perseverance is the most lasting civil affairs modus operandi. Such advisory effort is conducted on a daily basis by the CAC company commanders, the company civil affairs officer, the Bn CAO, and the assistant CAO. Additionally all marines in CAC have been educated on Civil Affairs goals and methods, on the importance of making the government work. All these marines, particularly compound commanders, can and do advise local citizens, officials, and military on what the government can and is doing. In conjunction with the advisory effort, the 1st MP Bn accomplishes those projects the GVN does not presently have the capability of handling, as follows:

2. PUBLIC EDUCATION.

a. Co "A" is teaching English at Tien Hoc School on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 1230 to 1330. English classes are also conducted at B. De School on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1230 to 1330.

b. Co "B" has made arrangements to enable personnel of this organization to teach English classes in hamlets in their area. The hamlets that will probably be effected are Da Me, controlled by Golf-5, and My Thi controlled by MCB-5.

c. Co "C" is currently giving English classes every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 1600 to 1700 at the Xuan Hoa Police Station.

d. Co "D" conducts English classes for twenty children at the Binh Khue Cam Primary School. The class is highly motivated and extremely interested in learning English.

3. PUBLIC HEALTH. Co "D" has spent 300 man hours on the rejuvenation of the Hoa Vang District Dispensary. They have been assisted by Vietnamese helpers to some extent. Co "B" has made arrangements for corpsmen from this organization to assist the corpsman in Golf-5 in holding sick calls in Da Me (1) and Da Me (2) twice each week. Daily sick call is held twice a day at all CAC compounds' aid stations. PF corpsmen are now assisting at all morning sick calls. During the month there were a total of 13,542 patients treated. Out of these, 1,965 were treated by PF corpsmen. During December there were 4,000 less patients treated than in November. This month 3,000 school children were inoculated against plague. In an effort to fight the plague problem a "rat war" was initiated last month. Pamphlets and posters were printed and distributed. Loudspeakers were used also. To date only moderate success has been achieved. A new aid station has been built within the F-3 compound. Public Sanitation and Hygiene movies are being shown in conjunction with Psy Ops movie festivals.

4. PUBLIC WORKS. Co "A" is assisting Hoa Cuong Village on a joint self-help improvement project, installing a culvert for a well-traveled bicycle path. On 26 Dec, Co "A" delivered to Mr.

Son, the Ap Bo Hamlet Chief, two 12" wide pipes approx. 10' long, 2" X 12" X 8' boards, and steel stakes. In the first week of Jan it is planned to send shovels and a truck driver with three marines to the Hoa Cuong Village Headquarters to begin the road improvements.

5. PUBLIC INFORMATION. See Section IX, Psychological Operations.

6. WELFARE.

a. Co "D" gave food and clothing to thirty families of Khue Trung I. The families were chosen by the assistant hamlet chief and care was taken to select and contribute only to needy families.

b. On the 28th of Dec Co "B", at their checkpoint (BT 062757), seized VC rice beneath the floorboards of a Vietnamese bus. On the same day Co "B" donated this rice (approx. 170 lbs) to a Catholic orphanage in DaNang East.

7. COMMUNITY RELATIONS.

a. Our secondary CA mission is to establish and maintain good civil military relations such that the Vietnamese will not give aid and comfort to the enemy. Projects particularly designed for accomplishing this secondary mission are as follows:

b. Co "A" has concentrated most of its effort in its civil affairs program for the month towards an up-to-date area study of the Hoa Tien Refugee Camp. Interviews have been held with the assistant at DaNang Refugee Center and with representatives from USAID. Priority is given to locating, and training for jobs. Additional studies have been made of Civil Affairs Projects for Hoa Tien Refugee Center.

c. In the early part of the month 250 bomb crates were delivered to Hoa Phat School for use in building desks and seats. Priorities within the village rest on public improvements. Additional studies have been made of civil affairs projects for Hoa Cuong Village.

d. Co "C" held a Christmas Party for the children of Canh Sat. The party, which included soda, candy, cookies, nuts, etc., benefitted 98 children. There were 98 dolls distributed as presents, which were procured from DaNang City Hall via Bn S-5. Also over 200 bars of soap were distributed. On 26 Dec 1966 the district representative, Mr. Dieu; the Xuan Hoa Police Chief,

Mr. Xuan, and a Police Executive Officer were invited to, and attended, the Bob Hope USO Show.

e. Co "D" delivered two truckloads of firewood to Khue Trung I, and one truckload of firewood to Bin Thai.

8. CIVIL AFFAIRS TRAINING.

a. A Battalion Civil Affairs meeting was held on 27 Dec 1966 for all company CAOs. Civil Affairs operations were reviewed and plans discussed. The Battalion Psy Ops officer briefly discussed Psy Ops and its relationship to public information operations with the Vietnamese Information Service.

b. On 20 Dec a class on Civil Affairs missions and operations was given to the marines of Combined Action Company "F".

9. SERIOUS INCIDENT REPORT. At about 241915H a Flying Tigers transport plane crashed in Binh Thai Hamlet (BT 013718). Co "A" and Co "D" sent reaction squads to the area immediately. "R&S" Co led Air Force fire trucks and first aid trucks to the crash site, followed shortly by the two "R&S" Co Reaction Platoons. Additional marines from the Battalion arrived shortly afterwards. All personnel worked to clear the crash site, and to find and evacuate the victims. At approximately 2330 1st Marine Division assumed control over civil affairs disaster assistance.

- G. With 3-9, One (1) dog located five (5) VC, one (1) shaped charge and fifteen (15) hand grenades.
- H. With 3rd Force Recon, one (1) dog alerted on an area where the grass was smashed down. It was believed to be a VC ambush site the night before.
- I. With 1-2, one dog alerted on a tunnel which had one (1) wounded VC inside. The dog also alerted on two (2) Vietnamese men trying to crawl away from the patrol. Another dog alerted on a treeline which, upon further investigation, yielded two VCS. Later the dog alerted off to the side of the patrol where two (2) men were watching the patrol. When the men saw the dog they started running and were apprehended.
- J. While with 1st Recon Bn., one (1) dog alerted while on a night patrol. When the patrol moved in to check it out, one (1) man was heard running away. Later the dog alerted across a river, the patrol set in and about fifteen minutes later lights were seen moving up a bank on the other side of the river. Artillery was called. Another dog alerted on a possible VC ambush and allowed a recon patrol to pass without being detected by the enemy.
- K. With 3rd Force Recon, a dog alerted and the patrol hit the deck just as a large burst of enemy fire zipped over their heads. Using the dog to tell where the enemy was, the patrol managed to quit the area without sustaining a casualty.
- L. With 3-7, a dog alerted on a freshly dug pangi trap. Later the dog alerted to the side of the patrol and a VCS get up and ran off. When the patrol fired at him, heavy enemy fire was returned. It is

believed that the dog caused a VC ambush to be effected prematurely.

M. With 3-9, one dog alerted on a group of villagers in a clump of trees. Upon further investigation four (4) of them were found to be VC.

N. With 7th Marines, one (1) dog alerted on a tunnel which yielded four (4) VC.

O. With 1-26, one (1) dog alerted on a 60mm mortar round which was booby trapped along the side of the trail.

P. One (1) sentry dog alerted on two (2) men running across a rice paddy with MAG 36 about 300 meters away. The reaction force was called in and swept the area with negative results.
