PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. (S) During the month of February, 1st Radio Battalion, through its operational platoons deployed throughout Quang Nam Province, provided direct near real-time support to tactical commanders of the 1st Marine Division, while the Battalion as a whole provided both direct and general support to the Headquarters, III Marine Amphibious Force, the U. S. Army XXIV Corps, the 1st Marine Division, and the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing. The direct support role was highlighted by the timely provision of vital tactical intelligence information to commanders in the field. The results of this direct support by 1st Radio Battalion elements ensured the continued loss by the enemy of personnel and equipment, the denial of freedom of movement to and from his forward base areas, and helped prevent the enemy from obtaining local provisions, supplies, and recruits.

1. (C) There was one major operation conducted by Free World Forces in Quang Nam Province during the month of February. Operation IMPERIAL LAKE continued with elements of the Fifth Marines, and these forces received direct near real-time support from a direct support unit and from operational elements of 1st Radio Battalion. Throughout Quang Nam Province III Marine Amphibious Force and U. S. Army XXIV Corps continued to be provided direct and general support by 1st Radio Battalion.
