#### 5. Special Operations

a. The Provisional Rifle Company conducted sixty (60) night patrols (Ambush, Recon, L.P.'s and Combat) and fourteen (14) day patrols during the month of July.

(1) On the evening of 6 July 1968 a FLC patrol found one ChiComm grenade booby trap at AT937817.

(2) On the evening of 17 July 1968 a Vietnamese Shrine (AT943813) was demolished by approximately 25lbs of explosives set off by unknown person(s).

(3) On the evening of 18 July 1968 a FLC patrol captured one (1) VC who was sleeping in the rice paddies at AT924814. He had three (3) M26 grenades on his person.

(4) On 23 July 1968 Camp Books received approximately thirteen (13) rounds of 122mm rocket fire resulting in 15% damage to one Quonset hut, 25% damage to the Officers Club and 10% damage to the Engineer Platoon Building. There were four (4) KIA.



An elementary school is planned for Tiep Cu II. This will be a self help project. The necessary self-help forms have been submitted for procurement of the needed materials, to construct this school.

The well renovation project has begun in Tiep Cu I. Cement has been delivered and new wells are being dug. Tiep Cu II has four (4) wells dug to date.

The dump level at ASP #1 increased 1,158 s/tons to 27,475 s/tons of which 21,707 s/tons are Class V (W) and 5,769 s/tons are Class V (A).

The dump level at ASP #2 increased 2,271 s/tons to 23,009 s/tons of which 15,092 s/tons are USMC assets and 7,917 s/tons are US ARMY assets.

The EOD Platoon made 371 calls, recovering 1,746 U. S. explosive items and 884 VC or Chi Com explosive items. The platoon destroyed 442 s/tons of unserviceable ammunition from ASP #1 that was too dangerous for deep water disposal.

with the assistance of the 7th Psychological Operations Department, movies and loudspeaker broadcasts are utilized in all three hamlets once a week. In addition, leaflets and Vietnamese newspapers are distributed throughout the hamlets.

2. The projects progress for each of the Hamlets is as follows:

a. Phuoc Xuan Hamlet, Hoa Khanh Village, coordinates C965782

1) The elementary school planned for Phuoc Xuan is under construction. Bricks have been delivered to Phuoc Xuan for use in the construction of this structure.

2) The Bakery at Phuoc Xuan has been completed. Men from the Supply Battalion Mess hall went to Phuoc Xuan and demonstrated to the people the proper methods of preparing bakery foods.

b. Tiep Cu Hamlet I and II, Hoa Khanh Village, Coordinates C954792

1) An elementary school is planned for Tiep Cu II. This will be a self-help project. The necessary self-help forms have been submitted for procurement of the needed materials, to construct this school.

2) The well renovation project has begun in Tiep Cu I. Cement has been delivered and new wells are being dug. Tiep Cu II has four (4) wells dug to date.

3) Tiep Cu I has been given a sewing machine. A sewing class will be held to teach the people of Tiep Cu I proper sewing methods and in turn create a minor industry for the hamlet.
