NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1st Battalion, 5th Marines continued to participate in Operation "TAYLOR COMMON". During this period, the Battalion conducted aggressive offensive operations to seek and destroy and capture enemy forces, weapons, material, and positions; secured and protected routes of ingress and egress for movement of friendly logistical support and supported and protected US and RVN installations and convoys.

PART IIISEQUENTIAL LISTINGS OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTSA. TOPICS1. PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

a. Strength. The Battalion's strength at the beginning of the month was 32 officers and 1138 enlisted. On the 15th of February, the strength had changed to 34 officers and 1109 enlisted. By the end of February, the strength was 35 officers and 1156 enlisted. At this time, there are 4 officers and 71 enlisted hospitalized. Joinings during the month were 6 officers and 233 enlisted.

b. Discipline, Law and Legal. 4 Summary Courts-Martial and 3 Special Courts-Martial were convened during February. There are 2 Summary and 2 Special Courts-Martial still to be processed. During February, 3 informal investigations were completed. There are 2 CID investigations pending.

c. POW/Detainees. There were 48 detainees processed during the month.

d. Morale. Morale and fighting spirit continued to be excellent. Personnel who captured POW's received in-country R&R.

e. Postal. Postal service continued at the same degree of excellence.

f. Awards. During February, there were numerous Navy Commendation and Navy Achievement Medals forwarded to members of this Command. Also during the month, there were 12 Navy Achievement, 1 Navy Commendation, 4 Bronze Star, and 1 Legion of Merit Medals submitted for heroism and meritorious service.

g. Interior Management. Administrative procedures and proficiency continued to be excellent.

2. ENEMY, WEATHER AND TERRAIN

a. Enemy. During this reporting period, the enemy continued his probing and harrassing tactics with a limited offensive attack occurring at 0200H, on 23 February 1969, in which he probed with small arms fire and attacked by 82mm mortars the Battalion's fire base at Phu Loc (6). A decrease was noted in the number of mine and booby trap incidents during this period with a total of 47 incidents, as compared to last months 129 incidents.

b. Weather. During this period, the weather was warm to hot during the daylight hours and mild to cool at night. Low ceilings hampered some air operations to a limited degree.

c. Terrain. No change.

3. ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

a. Organization. The organization of the Battalion consisted of the following parent units being detached and other units under the operational control of the 1st Battalion during the following periods:

(1) Company K, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines OPCON to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from January through 120800H Feb 1969.

(2) Company C, 1st Battalion, 7th Marines OPCON to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from January through 141800H Feb 1969.

(3) Company C, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 5th Marines from January through 201600H Feb 1969.

(4) Company B (-), 1st Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 5th Marines from 070800H Feb through 141400H Feb 1969.

(5) Company C, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 5th Marines from 220800H Feb through 282400H Feb 1969.

(6) Company A, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 5th Marines from 231400H Feb through 282400H 1969.

(7) Company H, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines OPCON to 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from 231730H Feb through 242600H Feb 1969.

b. Operations. During this reporting period, the Battalion continued to participate in Operation "TAYLOR COMMON" (Search and Destroy Operation) in the eastern part of Duc Duc District and the Duy Xuyen District in the Quang Nam Province of RVN.

c. Supporting Arms

(1) Air. The Battalion continued to receive outstanding air support from the 1st MAW and from both in and out-of-country USAF squadrons. Air operations during the beginning of the month were hampered by poor weather, resulting in a decrease in total fixed wing support compared with December and January. A detailed breakdown of air support rendered the Battalion is as follows:

(a) Fixed Wing. A total of 133 flights of fixed wing were flown in support of this Battalion. 57 AC/TACA aircraft provided 72.1 hours of on station coverage, controlling 22 flights of fixed wing close air support and providing limited close air support with their own ordnance as well as flying protective cover, conducting visual reconnaissance and controlling some of the artillery fires. Additionally, 42 flights of fixed wing were controlled by Battalion FAC's and 69 A-6 Radar Beacon strikes were completed during this period. Further fixed wing support consisted of 9 "Spooky" AC-47 gunships providing 12.3 hours of target coverage and 7 flareships providing 19.3 hours of illumination. Of the total number of flights completed, bomb damage assessment is available for only 45 missions and is listed below:

(b) Rotary Wing. Helicopter operations consisted of daily re-supply missions, and occasional instances of "Huey Gunship" close air support. The bulk of helicopter support was med-evac missions extracting 135 Marines (60 of whom were emergency category) and 22 indigenous personnel.

(c) Significant Developments. Although February's fixed wing totals were slightly low, there was a significant increase in night close air support. The "Night Owl" mission has passed the development stage and has proven itself operationally reliable. The USAF completed 31 of these missions during the month, delivering a variety of ordnance (500 & 750 lb bombs, napalm and 20mm) as close as 200 meters to friendly positions. Of the 69 A-6 Radar Beacon strikes completed, 57 were flown during the hours of darkness under all weather conditions. "Spooky" gunships, artillery and organic supporting arms have been used during air strikes for anti-aircraft fire suppression and blocking fires.

(2) Artillery. The following artillery units were in direct support of the Battalion during the dates indicated: 1-19 February, Tango Battery (4 155mm) and one platoon of Whiskey Battery (2 4.2" Howtars) of the 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines. 20-22 February, Delta Battery, 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines with 4 155mm and 4 105mm. 23-28 February, direct support was provided directly from the 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines. Throughout the month, reinforcing fires were provided by 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines and the 1st Field Artillery Group. From the period of 23 February and continuing into the month of March, FO's called directly into the Artillery Battalion for supporting fires, allowing the Artillery Battalion to use any battery not committed at the time of request, and providing faster fire support to the requesting unit.

(3) Engineers. Excellent support was again provided by Company B, 1st Engineer Battalion. Engineers were employed primarily to destroy duds, booby traps, captured enemy ammunition, enemy bunkers/fortifications and to conduct daily mine sweeps of the road networks in the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines AO. Numerous mines and booby traps were detected by visual sightings and mine detecting equipment. Loss of lives, wheeled and tracked equipment was considerably reduced by the detailed searching efforts employed by the engineers.

(4) Shore Party (HST). HST's were provided by Company B, 1st Shore Party Battalion. These teams provided satisfactory support in coordinating and effecting helicopter resupply and Med-Evacs.

(5) Antrac. A light section of the 4th Platoon, Company A, 3rd Antrac Battalion was in direct support of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines during this period. The LVT's provided satisfactory support in transporting troops.

(6) Tanks. A light section of the 2nd Platoon, Company B, 1st Tank Battalion was in direct support of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines. Excellent results were achieved by using tanks to support the daily MSR mine sweeps, providing direct fire support to the daytime Battalion OP's, and were also used extensively as convoy security between An Hoa and Liberty Bridge, and at night were employed into the defensive networks of Liberty Bridge.

(7) Scout Snipers. Detachment Scout Sniper Platoon, Headquarters Company, 5th Marines provided excellent support for the Battalion, which resulted in 6 enemy kills during the month.

4. TRAINING

a. The following training was conducted during the month:

- (1) Weapons Safety
- (2) Weapons Inspection, Care and Cleaning
- (3) Mapping
- (4) Leadership

b. All companies during their period of bridge defense continued to have instruction and familiarization firing of all individual and crew served weapons, including the LAAW-72, hand grenades and Claymore mines.

c. Replacement personnel received four (4) days training at 5th Marines Headquarters prior to being committed to the field.

d. The Battalion continued to utilize schools provided by higher headquarters. During the month, 23 members of the Battalion attended schools in the DaNang area and Okinawa.

e. Classes were conducted on enemy mines/booby traps by the 1st Engineer Battalion to one company at Liberty Bridge defense, one company at Charlie Base Camp and the Battalion Rear on 4, 5 and 6 February 1969.

f. Demonstration of the Multi-shot Portable Flame Weapon was conducted for 83 personnel of the Battalion at An Hoa, 5th Marines school range on 17 February 1969.

g. Vehicle Safety and Driver's Maintenance of the M274A2 (Mule) and M151A1 (Jeep). 20 driver's licenses were issued for M274A2 Mule and M151A1 Jeep.

5. LOGISTICS. No serious problems have occurred during this period to impair the logistical support of the Battalion.

6. CIVIL AFFAIRS. During this reporting period, the Battalion worked with the people of Mau Chanh (2) (AT 884471) and some limited work in Phu Da (2) (AT 871481).

The Battalion assisted the people of Mau Chanh (2) in constructing 11 homes previously damaged or destroyed. Another 17 homes are still under construction or repair. A total of 370 assorted sheets of plywood and 88 assorted boards have been distributed for this purpose. There were 10 trailer loads of firewood delivered to supplement the shortage in the hamlet. Delivered 1 trailer load of sand, 4 bags of cement, 1 set of carpenter tools and 1 set of masonry tools for a pig pen now under construction.

There was 1 sanitation film and 2 cartoons shown to 250 people of Mau Chanh (2) to improve sanitation in the hamlet.

The Battalion assisted the people of Phu Da (2) in reconstructing 6 new homes. A total of 90 assorted sheets of plywood and 10 assorted boards were used in the rebuilding.

7. PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS. During this period, the Battalion received very little intelligence information from the elders. Intelligence information received has been passed on to Battalion S-2 and Counter Intelligence.

In accordance with the rewards program, the following ordnance has been turned in to the Battalion: 1 M-16 rifle, 1 155mm round, 4 105mm rounds, 2 81mm rounds, 7 60mm rounds, 1 3.5" rocket round, 4 M-18A1 mines, 10 M-26 grenades, 21 M-79 rounds, 160 linked 7.62mm rounds, 150 blasting caps, 1 detonator and 3 unknown type booby traps. A total of 25,000 \$VN has been paid from the VIP fund for the above ordnance. The attitude of the people toward this Battalion remains excellent.

8. COMMUNICATIONS. During this month, communications within the Battalion were maintained in a satisfactory manner with no significant problems encountered. A new communications bunker was constructed in the Battalion Rear area to provide a central location for operation of both radio and wire. The wire system in Alpha Defense Sector was taken out and a new layout using five pair telephone cable was installed. The wire section completely rewired the Forward CP for electrical power, taking out the existing lines and replacing them with a safer and more efficient system.

The AN/PRC-88 squad radios were tested by the communications section and the guard in the Alpha Defense Sector of the 1st Battalion Rear. The radio is used as a backup for the wire system and has proved itself to be highly dependable. A radio is provided to the XO, S-3, S-4, Supply O, MTO, CommO, each bunker on the lines and the command bunker in Alpha Sector. This enables instant communications and gives us the ability to spread information quickly.
