





PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During the month of January 1969, the 9th MAB continued to fulfill its assigned mission. Besides the in-country operations, there was the continuous requirement to: rehab personnel and equipment, train and replace personnel, and plan for contingencies.

During 1-7 January BGen J.E. WILLIAMS CTF 79/CG 9th MAB conferred with CTF-76 to approve the initial plan for Operation BOLD MARINER. After assuming Opcon of HMM-164 and BLT 3/26, CTG 79.5 conducted training/rehab at sea and continued planning for Operation BOLD MARINER. TG 79.4 was engaged in Operation VALIANT HUNT during this period. General WILLIAMS, aboard the Eldorado attended an informal Change of Command ceremony 6 Jan, visited the Chief of Staff and G-3 of III MAF on 10 January, and participated in the presail conference aboard the Eldorado on 11 Jan. Concurrent and parallel planning with III MAF, the Americal Division, TF 76 and TF Cooksey proceeded satisfactorily for Operation BOLD MARINER.

Operation BOLD MARINER commenced on 13 January with BGen John E. WILLIAMS commanding the landing force. This unique operation included: cordon and clearing operations, coordinating supporting arms using Army artillery, massive evacuation of a civilian populace in support of III MAF accelerated Pacification Campaign, and both civilian and troop medevacs. This was the first Brigade size amphibious assault conducted by TF 79 and considered the largest since the Inchon landing in Korea. RAdmiral BEHRENS; CATF, BGen WILLIAMS; CLF, and BGen COOKSEY; Cmdr TF Cooksey conferred daily during the operation. On 22 January, LtGen BUSE; CG FMFPAC, VAdm BRINGLE; COMSEVENTHFLT and LtGen STILLWELL; Acting CG III MAF visited CTF 76/CTF 79 and CTF Cooksey aboard the USS Eldorado and were briefed on Operation BOLD MARINER.

On 24 January BLT 3/26 was chopped to Task Force Cooksey and simultaneously control was returned to TF 79.5. The 9th MAB staff returned to Okinawa. BLT 2/26 was backloaded by 241200 hrs and off loaded Danang Harbor on the 25th for chop ashore to III MAF.

On 26 January BGen WILLIAMS departed Okinawa to attend the 7th Fleet scheduling conference at Baguio R.P.I.

During period 30 Jan - 1 Feb 12 aircraft of VMFA-122 departed MCAS Iwakuni to conduct 45 day air to air/air to ground training deployment. BLT 2/26 remained ashore under Opcon 1st Mar Div in Operation LINN RIVER. BLT 3/26 continued search and clear operations with TF Cooksey.

KADENA AFB, Okinawa, Jan. 4 — "Tell it to the Marines!" That's exactly what Air Force Technical Sergeant Charles Hawes, Assistant Non-Commissioned Officer-in-Charge, Explosive Ordnance Disposal Section (EOD), 418th Munitions Maintenance Squadron, did when he encountered trouble last month.

Hawes, an ex-Marine EOD man himself, had been instructed to have his experts clear an old (World War II) ammunition dump just outside Kadena on U. S. Army land.

The air force had placed the site off-limits, posted warning signs and patrolled it regularly since early 1945, when it was decided the area was unnecessary for further operations and too hazardous to enter.

Then, just before Christmas last year, the air force decided to install a mobile aircraft guidance system on the site to land aircraft more safely during foul weather. As a result, the EOD section was instructed to find the quickest and safest method of clearing away the hazardous WWII ammunition.

Following instructions, Hawes called Marine Regimental Landing Team-26's "A"-Company, 5th Amphibious Battalion for assistance. He asked company commander, First Lieutenant Henry W. McGee, if the Marines would help his men clear the site with an LVTE-1 Amphibious Tractor, specially designed to clear mines from beachheads during Marine amphibious assaults.

The answer was of course, "Yes!" Once necessary preparations were made, Marine Second Lieutenant John H. Benz, company executive officer, and Air Force Technical Sergeant Paul U. Merial, EOD Section NCOIC, were assigned as project supervisors.

On Dec. 16, the Marines and their saber-toothed LVTE-1 (which looks like an enclosed flat-bottomed boat with wheels) landed and the situation was well in hand. Working closely with airmen assigned to the project, the crew of the giant tractor plowed the area for four days, unearthing more than 250 rounds of ammunition, ranging from 50-caliber machine gun shells to 105-mm high explosive artillery rounds. Despite heavy rains, causing the LVTE-1's long teeth to clog up every few sweeps, the project was deemed a success Dec. 20 and the area was declared safe.

Technical Sergeant Merial, pleased with the results, remarked: "The Marines saved us months of work, clearing the site quickly and without incident." Pointing to the LVTE-1, he said, "That monster is ideally suited for this type of work and the Marines who run it did their jobs well. They gave us all the cooperation we could have asked for."

In closing he remarked, "It's a good thing TechSgt. Hawes came up with the solution to our problem or we might never have finished the job."

Lieutenant Young was elated! For several weeks he had been looking for just that type of material to supply the Nakadomari Village school for a woodshop. After making a brief inspection of the building, he found it soundly constructed and large enough to house the activity, and placed several calls to coordinate the project.

First he called Mr. Shohe Oshiro of the American-Ryukyuan Cultural Center in Ishakawa to inform him that the building was available. Since he did not speak Japanese and the members of the Nakadomari PTA did not speak a great deal of English, he asked Mr. Oshiro to set up a delivery date, time and place.

Receiving the necessary information in a return call from Mr. Oshiro, he called 9th MAB's Provisional Service Battalion for assistance in moving the huge building from its present location to Nakadomari Village. Next Lt. Young contacted 3rd FSR's Engineer Support Platoon to lift the building onto the flatbed at its present site. Staff Sergeant Arthur Craker, operations chief, was assigned the task of supervising the loading. Four fork lifts, used to move heavy packages in storing were set aside to complete the loading phase.

Once the loading, transporting and unloading phases were organized, Lt. Young called the Army's 62nd Military Police Company, Sukiran to arrange an escort and plan the 20-mile route which the wide, bulky load would take to the new site.

Careful attention was given to the clearance height and width of the load to insure no damage to civilian property during the trip, and Army Sergeant Willis Wooten was assigned the task of insuring the convoy arrived safely.

The project got underway Jan. 3, as planned. Under the supervision of Lt. Harris and SSgt. Craker the structure was lifted from its foundation by one 15,000-pound and three 6,000 pound capacity fork lifts.

Next 3rd FSR Marines cleared the debris from beneath the structure and loaded two thirty-foot length, eight-inch thick beams onto the flatbed. These kept the weight of the cumbersome cargo in the center of the truck and off the tires.

Once this was finished, Cpl. Scott backed the flatbed under the load and the four fork lift drivers lowered the structure gently into position. Satisfied the load was stable, Cpl. Scott gave the go-ahead. With Sgt. Wooten leading the way, the curious procession started its long journey to the school site.

Sgt. Wooten held up traffic on both sides of Highway #1 while the flatbed made its turn at the rear gate.

Once off base the entourage moved slowly north up the four-lane highway toward its destination, taking up two lanes of traffic. Reaching Kadena Circle, Cpl. Scott slowed to a crawl to clear parked cars and overhanging wires without mishap. He admitted later the building was the largest load he had ever transported. Continuing through the outskirts of Kadena, the huge mobile structure attracted a great deal of attention from pedestrians and drivers alike.

Once outside of Kadena it was smooth sailing until the convey reached a small bridge one-mile north. There, as already estimated, the wide load had only inches of clearance on either side. At a snail's pace, Cpl. Scott managed to cross the span with only one minor mishap. The top of the building brushed a lamp post and damaged it slightly.

As soon as the convoy had cleared the bridge, Sgt. Wooten pulled them off the road to allow following traffic, which was now backed up for more than a quarter of a mile, to pass. Continuing 15-minutes later, the convoy prepared itself for the roughest part of the trek.

Ahead lay hair-pin turns and the hilliest and narrowest stretch of Highway #1. The major concern was negotiating this two-lane road without losing the awkward load.

Thanks to the combined driving skills of Sgt. Wooten and Cpl. Scott, the danger proved to be negligible, and the convoy arrived safely in Nakadomari Village, where it pulled off to the left side of the road to a predetermined temporary site.

There they were met by Mr. Oshiro; Mr. Choshin Tokuyama, Nakadomari head teacher; Mr. Seibun Henna, Nakadomari PTA Chairman; several of the village officials and the PSB crane.

The structure was unloaded carefully and gently placed out of the way of passing traffic. Amid smiles of thanks the Marines, who had completed their phase of the operation, departed; leaving the final phase to the Nakadomari PTA, which began renovating the building immediately so their children would be better prepared than they to meet an industrial future.

MCAF, FUTEA, Okinawa, Jan. 16 -- Okinawa's only completely helicopter-transportable Marine ground control approach unit makes its home here.

The unit, 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade's Marine Air Traffic Control Unit-66 (MATCU-66), is actually a portable aircraft control tower plus radar guidance system which can be disassembled and reconstructed anywhere within a matter of days. It is designed specifically to safely land and launch aircraft from a temporary landing field in direct support of Marine infantry units, but is equally adaptable to replace any modern aircraft tower, no matter how complex.

According to Captain Arden E. Romsos, MATCU-66 officer-in-charge, the unit's sole function while stationed on Okinawa "is to prepare itself for actual use in combat in case of enemy contingency or attack in the Far East.

Once in combat, its main job is to provide aircraft pilots with continuous visual and radar air-ground control and insure the safe, fast flow of air traffic in any assigned control area.

"Since the basic MATCU system was integrated into the Marine Corps aviation program earlier this decade, it has proved itself invaluable in Vietnam, while working in conjunction with Shortened Airfields for Tactical Support (SATS) at Phu Bai, Chu Lai and Dong Ha. Not only can the unit be assembled quickly in difficult terrain, it can also be readily moved to another location when, and if, a permanent air control tower is set up at it's present location."

All radar operators and technicians reporting to MATCU-66 already possess the basic skills required to do their work; having already attended at least 16 weeks of intensive training at San Diego, Calif. Most have attended more advanced courses or worked with stateside MATCU or control tower units as well.

But since the system is complex and ever-changing, all spend the majority of their time here mastering their trade and brushing up on the basics. Since the air facility already has a control tower and the necessary radar equipment to handle incoming or outgoing aircraft, MATCU-66 Marines have no present tactical function. Consequently they spend their days training themselves, attending lectures, taking verbal and written tests on phases of the unit's operation and putting their knowledge to work in practice drills.

Among the subjects MATCU-66 operators study are: aircraft communication jargon; methods of identifying aircraft within a zone of responsibility; procedures to follow to relay weather information, altimeter changes, headings, speed and final approach patterns to the aircraft; and immediate action drills to follow in case any part of the system fails in an emergency.

Technicians review repair procedures to follow in case part of the equipment breaks down, learn installation and how to incorporate modern changes into the unit's electronic system.

The rest of the time goes to disassembling and reconstructing the unit's gear, which includes four interlocked radar vans (which form a tracking and guidance complex), a portable aluminum control tower and three radar parabolas (long-range, medium-range and precision).

With this constant advanced training program, it's no wonder that these Marines feel sure that they will be able to perform their combat roles effectively and efficiently should any emergency arise.

CAMP SCHWAB, Okinawa, Jan. 22—The Marine Base called Camp Schwab that is the home of Regimental Landing Team-26 (Rear) (RLT-26) has a beach that is about a mile long and ideally suited for training exercises involving tracked vehicles.

Company "A", 5th Tank Battalion, a sub-unit of RLT-26, uses the beach as a proving grounds when training their four-man tank crews.

Early in the morning, when it's barely light enough to see, a tank will appear on the crest of the most distant hill on the beach, carefully negotiating its way down a piece of difficult terrain.

When it reaches the bottom of the hill there is a long flat area of sandy beach and the vehicle immediately picks up speed. It moves fast, over 30 miles per hour, surprisingly fast considering the bulky 52-ton steel body that makes up an M-48 A3 tank.

Then there's another hill — this one is covered with thick underbrush. Again the tank slows down as it crosses the rough, unfamiliar area. It stops, backs up, and turns in different directions as the driver makes himself familiar with the maneuverability of the vehicle.

Tank crewmen in the Marine Corps go to school for four weeks at Camp Pendleton, California. After that that they learn by on-the-job training of the sort conducted here.

Besides the driver there are three others in a tank crew. The senior man, the tank commander, acts as an overall supervisor and coordinator of the team.

The gunner handles the big 90mm gun that protrudes from the turret. In addition this type of tank has a 30 caliber and a 50 caliber machinegun as part of its arsenal.

A loader assists the gunner in the operation of the guns. Together a good gun crew can fire 10 to 12 rounds a minute from the big turret gun. There are eight different types of rounds that can be fired from the 90mm gun. It has a range of up to 11 miles and sits on a moveable turret that can be operated electrically or hydraulically.

When one four-man crew has completed a run up and down the beach the vehicle returns to the tank park and another crew takes over the operation of the vehicle.

All the crew become increasingly familiar with every aspect of their job and RLT-26's Company "A", 5th Tank Battalion, a unit of the deployable 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade, has continued its mission of training tank crews for duty in the Far East.

CAMP SCHWAB, Okinawa, Jan. 17—Marine crews of the big armored troop carriers at this base are learning to work the new device on their tractors and answer an age old military puzzle.

The puzzle is "how to breach an enemy mine field quickly, and without getting anyone killed or injured."

The answer came with the development of the linear line charge, a sausage linked line 305 feet long, containing 1700 pounds of high explosive Composition-4 (C-4). The charge is tied to a modified Sidewinder missile, which is used to deliver the payload to its target when fired from the Amphibious tractor.

This revolutionary device has all but eliminated the hazardous job of mine probing along the beachheads.

During a recent training exercise held at Camp Schwab, Marines from "A" Company, 5th Amphibious Tractor Battalion (Amtrac), teamed up with Marines from "A" Company, 5th Engineer Battalion for operation BOOM, the practical application and firing of a linear line charge device.

"The primary purpose of this exercise," explained Gunnery Sergeant Charles L. Golden, 1st Platoon Commander, 5th Amtrac Bn., "is to train the crews of the LVTE-1 Amtracs in the handling, loading, and actual firing of linear line charge devices from Amphibious tractors."

The C-4 is a plastic type explosive which burns at the rate of 26,000 feet per second, and is linked together forming a line 305 feet long. The explosive is packaged in a pallet, a metal box weighing 1390 pounds. A modified Sidewinder missile is used to carry the explosive in on target. The line charge and its components are lowered into the body of an amtrac where it will be readied for firing.

Corporal Henry B. Nunley, Crew Chief of the LVTE-1 Amtrac, supervised the cent loading of the linear line charge aboard his tractor.

"In order to load the C-4 and container," explained Cpl. Nunley, "it is first lowered onto the lock cage of the Amtrac by use of an overhead crane. Once this is accomplished the pallet is locked in place and lowered into the body of the tractor."

With the C-4 safely aboard the Amtrac, Engineers from "A" Company, 5th Engineer Battalion take over the tedious job of connecting the line charge to the modified Sidewinder missile.

Gunnery Sergeant M. Vega, Company "A", 5th Engineer Bn., explains, "Our purpose is to see that the missile gets off the tractor and in on its target. "Our job consists of hooking up all electrical connections from the line charge to the missile. "The most important connection, or hook-up, is the 1/4 inch cables which tie the line charge to the Sidewinder missile. "These cables must be drawn tight around the missile, their purpose is to act as a guidance system."

Once the connections are made and the cables tight, the missile is lowered into its firing grooves atop the IVTE-1 Amtrac and raised to a 45 degree angle to ensure maximum distance. Now the linear line charge is ready for firing.

Using the count-down method, the missile is fired, and trailing behind, is a line 305 feet long resembling a kite tail.

Laid out in a straight line the charge is ignited, Operation BOM is over, a mine field is cleared, and a path 60 feet wide and 305 feet long awaits Marines as they come ashore.
