NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- GENERAL. (U) During the period 1-31 March 1967, Marine Wing Headquarters Group One continued to provide 1st Marine Aircraft Wing with support in air control, air defense, administration and maintenance of Wing Headquarters Camp Facilities.
- PERSONNEL. (C) All squadrons and battalions except 2nd LAAMBn, have joined sufficient trained personnel to achieve a C-1 category. 2nd LAAMBn remained in C-2 category due to deficient personnel strength in certain MOS's.
- ADMINISTRATION. (U) Routine Administration progressed through out the month of March.
- MORALE/WELFARE. (U) Liberty remained secured in DaNang and Hoa Phut Village, outside the DaNang Air Base, through out the month of March. The beach facilities in the DaNang/Chu Lai areas were open to all hands and provided the majority of recreation for personnel. A new indoor theater was opened on Hill 327, running continuously from 1030 until 1800 each day. In country R&R was provided at China Beach and there were one day cultural sight-seeing trips to Hue. R&R flights to the following locations were conducted during March:

- CASUALTIES. (U) During the month of March there were fifteen (15) non-hostile casualties, resulting in three (3) deaths. Two deaths were caused by gunshot wounds, one an accidental discharge, and one a suspected self-inflicted wound. A LAAM Bn driver was crushed when the truck he was driving left the road and overturned coming down Monkey Mountain. There were no hostile casualties.

- b. On the evening of 4 March a demonstration by Vietnamese was held in front of bunker number 7.
- c. On 15 March Pfc Gore of H&HS-1 shot himself in the head while in the Hoa Phut Village.

9. TRAINING. (C)

- a. General Military Subjects Training was conducted by all units of this Command.
- b. Troop indoctrination lectures were given for all newly arrived personnel.
- c. Technical training was conducted by the LAAM Battalions in the form of practice drills and the use of transient aircraft as practice targets, as follows:

7. MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION

a. Civil affairs recap for MACS-7 for the month of March 1967.

- (1) Civic Action Officer taught English to 10 Vietnamese. 8 Men, 8 women, 2 male and 5 female children treated in hamlet of Trung Toan.
- (2) Civic Action Officer taught English to 8 Vietnamese. 8 Men, 3 women, 1 male and 1 female children treated in hamlet of Trung Toan.
- (3) Civic Action Officer taught English to 11 Vietnamese. 2 male, and 3 female children treated in hamlet of Trung Toan.
- (4) The MACS-7 Civic Action Officer and the Civic Action Officer of the 1st Shore Party Battalion met with the village chief, Mr. Tien and 6 hamlet chiefs of Ky Ha village. The subject of discussion was the construction of a 4 room privately operated school for the residents of Ky Ha and surrounding villages. Funds are to be supplied by a U.S. Veterans organization, "The Forty and Eight." The project received enthusiastic support from the local Vietnamese leaders. Mr. Tien assured the Civic Action Officers that he would obtain the written approval of the Ty Tin District Chief as the construction is to be done entirely by the Vietnamese with Marine supervision. Mr. Tien is also getting labor and material cost estimates. A second meeting was planned for 9 March. Mr. Nguyen Von Ton, a University of Saigon graduate who is currently teaching high school in Tam Ky, served as the interpreter. 5 Men, 2 woman, 9 male and 4 Female children treated in hamlet of Trung Toan.
- (5) GySgt Erickson and GySgt Deskins accompanied the Civic Action Officer to the hamlet of Trung Toan for the purpose of presenting cantelope and squash seeds to the citizens of the hamlet. The seeds were donated by the Mayor of Yuma at the request of GySgt Erickson.
- (6) The Civic Action Officer and the Trung Toan hamlet chief, Mr. The, attended a meeting of Ky Ha village leaders. The meeting was called for and presided over by General Stiles, Commanding General of Task Force X-Ray, for the purpose of discussing security condition in the Chu Lai area.
- (7) Civic Action Officer made several English tapes for a local school teacher for future instructional purposes. 10 men, 9 women, 6 male, and 5 female children treated in hamlet of Trung Toan.
- (8) Civic Action Officer had lunch with the family of a village elder. The purpose of the occasion was to honor the ancestors. Techniques of planting and growing cantelope were explained to the hamlet chief. 4 men, 14 women, 11 male and 7 female children treated in the hamlet of Trung Toan.
- (9) MACS-7 Civic Action Officer met briefly with the Ky Ha village chief concerning the proposed high school project. Mr. Tien explained that he would have all the necessary documents by 13 March.

(10) 6 men, 9 women, 6 male and 1 female children treated in hamlet of Trung Toan.

(12) MACS-7 Civic Action Team showed 7 movies in the hamlets of Trung Toan and Sam Hai. Audiences ranged from 150 to 200 at each showing. Shown were psychological warfare films, several films on life in the United-States, and movie on public health.

b. Civil affairs recap for 1st LAAM'S BN for the month of March 1967.

(1) During the month of March, the following has been delivered by 1st LAAM'S to Huong Truong IV school which is in Hoa Cuong village.

1500 lbs of canned surplus food
 230 bags of cement
 9 truck loads of scrap wood
 97 school books
 130 12 oz boxes of bubble bath
 1 blackboard
 3 rolls of barbed wire
 10 water buckets
 250 100 lb bundles of clothing

(2) On 27 March 1967, 25 bundles of clothing were given to Thuong Ap Sinh Khue Truong IV school which is also located in Hoa Cuong village.

(3) The new school at Huong Truong IV is coming along very well in progress. The foundation for the two classrooms is built along with the 4 walls to one of the classrooms. There are 6 workers to build the school each day. The children are temporarily being taught at Tan Sinh IV school.

(4) Teaching at Sacred Heart during the month of March amounted to 6 instructors teaching a one hour class to approximately 30 students for 5 nights a week.

(5) On March 10 a stove was delivered to Sacred Heart Orphanage. The project was started over a year ago. The stove is an oil burning stove and would have cost over \$22,000.00 if we did not get help in getting it over here. As it was it cost \$650.00. \$300.00 was donated by Millie Harper of Chicago, \$100.00 by Wing Chaplains fund and the rest by 1st LAAM'S BN.

(6) After completion of the school at Huong Truong IV school I plan to have a Medical Dispensary built to house a Med Cap.

b. Protestant services were held at 0930 Sundays and 1830 Sunday through Saturday. Sunday attendance was 278 (plus 126 at Easter Sunrise service); weekday attendance was 309; Good Friday, 40; Memorial Service for PFC James GORE, 45. Communed: 52.

c. Jewish services totaled 133 in attendance.

d. Episcopalian services totaled 28 in attendance.

e. Orthodox services totaled 40 in attendance.

2. Personnel

a. Chaplain Peter Ferreri, CDR, CHC, USN Wing Chaplain serves as Roman Catholic Chaplain for MWHG-1.

b. Chaplain Charles G. Smith, LT, CHC, USNR, continues as Protestant Chaplain, and Chaplain David Saltzman is the Jewish Chaplain.

3. Chaplain Smith conducted 4 services for CAC units (F-1 through F-7) in our area, with an attendance of 25.

4. Civic Action

a. Group Chaplains donated to Christian and Missionary Alliance Vietnamese Churches three (3) loads of lumber, two (2) loads of cement; to DaNang Baptist Mission, one (1) load of lumber and cement, to Arvn Chaplain Linh, one (1) crate school pads, one (1) box school supplies.

5. Group Chaplain took part in one (1) Indoctrination Lecture with 15 attending.
