

PART II Significant Highlights

a. None.

PART III Sequential Listing of Events

a. Personnel. During the month of July the Squadron joined 4 Marine Corps Officers, 26 Marine Corps Enlisted and 3 Navy Enlisted. Three Marine Corps Officers, 18 Marine Corps Enlisted were transferred. During the month 9 Marine Corps Enlisted were promoted to Sergeant, thirteen to Corporal, twenty-five to Lance Corporal and one to Private First Class. Twelve Marine Corps enlisted personnel extended their rotation tour dates for seven months. Nine Marine Corps enlisted personnel departed on special leave and nine returned from special leave.

b. Training. The following correspondence courses were applied for during July 1967:

(1) MCI - 11

(2) USAFI - 8

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c. Motor Transport

(1) The motor transport section of MABS-11 operated with an average effective strength of 106 during the month of July 1967.

(2) The operations section fulfilled approximately 2,945 vehicle requests, traveling 103,182 miles. 97,546 passengers were carried and 6,803 tons of cargo hauled in addition to 4,199.2 tons of ordnance. The Refueler section hauled 64,320 gallons of diesel fuel, 392,138 gallons of 115/145, 34,172 gallons of 80 octane, and 205,000 gallons of water. The motor transport tire shop repaired 311 motor transport tires in addition to 22 heavy equipment tires. No major accidents were reported.

(3) The maintenance section accepted 114 vehicles for repair and 91 were completed. 14 annual inspections and 53 quarterly inspections were completed. The machine shop completed 43 work orders during July. There were no lost man hours due to shop accidents.

d. Maintenance

(1) Laundry. During the month 5,650 bags of laundry were washed and dried for personnel. Washed 1,650 pounds for Sickbay, 235 pounds for dental, 60 pounds for material, 75 pounds for motor transport and 130 pounds for the messhall.

(2) Electrical. The Electric Shop provided electrical service to the LOX plant, rewired the Group S-1 office. Rewired and air conditioned the Group Briefing Room, rewired and air conditioned officers hut for night flyers.

(3) Plumbing. Total water provided was 1,407,000 gallons.

(4) Welding Shop. Manufactured structure for new Marine Aircraft Group 11 Main Gate, also manufactured 40 cages for storage of flares.

(5) Carpenter Shop. Installed new main gate, placed sod along sidewalk at Marine Aircraft Group Headquarters, also repaired various buildings damaged by the rocket attack.

e. TAFDS Pumped 3,624,917 gallons of AVGAS/JP-4.

f. LOX Produced a total of 11,760 gallons of LOX. Issued a total of 14,985 gallons of LOX to both Marine Corps and Air Force Units.

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g. Ordnance. During the month of July 1967 the Ordnance Section of MABS-11 accomplished the following:

(1) Received Class V(A) Munitions from the following ships:

- (a) SS CAPER VICTORY
- (b) SS MORGANTOWN VICTORY
- (c) SS CREIGHTON VICTORY
- (d) SS TRANSNORTHERN VICTORY
- (e) SS FRONTENAC VICTORY
- (f) LST 47

(2) Total bombs received during this period was 5,174 for a total of 2,783,000 pounds.

(3) In addition, we received 2,203 adapter boosters, 4,874 bomb fins, 14,568 fuzes, 803 fin locking nuts, 96 rocket pods, 2,592 rocket warheads, 4,216 rocket motors, 1,696 rocket fuzes, 1,240 suspension bands, 18,199 parachute flares, 55 CAD's, 2 chaff, 146 wafer switches, 45 switching kits, 303 empty rocket pods.

(4) During July this section belted and delivered 39,408 rounds of 20 MM ammunition, to the squadrons of MAG-11; delivered 136 rocket pods, assembled and delivered 11,552 bombs along with all the items necessary to make a complete round, ie. fuze, booster, arming wires, suspension lugs, etc.

(5) In addition to the aboved, this section issued to other Marine/Air Force units the following munitions:

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h. Material. The Material Section passed a total of 1,122 Navy and Marine Corps requisitions.

i. Food Services. The messhall served approximately 201,728 individual meals, produced 20,311 pounds of bread, prepared food for 27 parties.

j. Morest. Normal operations were conducted throughout the month with the M-21 Arresting Gear. A total of 252 arrested landings were made, including 75 engagements of Air Force Aircraft and 9 emergency arrestments.

k. Communication. Message Center processed 5,600 incoming and 1,931 outgoing messages. Wire Section handled over 80,000 telephone calls.

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
