NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During July the MAG-12 Civic Action Team delivered building materials to local schools and continued plans for the forthcoming school year. MedCap teams treated 1,960 Vietnamese during the month of July.

2. During the month of July MAG-12's combat sorties and combat hours decreased to their lowest level during the past 12 months.

## COMMAND CHRONOLOGY

During July medcaps were held as usual in Ky Chanh Village. Approximately 1960 Vietnamese were treated for various illnesses. The main problems encountered in medcaps are scabbies and unclearliness. Soap and other health items along with medicine are passed out to the vietnamese with instructions on how to properly use them, thereby eliminating some of these disorders. Marines from VMA-311, VMA-533, VMA-211 and VMA-223 have been very helpful to the MAG-12 Civic Action Team by providing security during the Medcaps when we are in some of our less secure areas. The MAG-12 Civic Action Team assisted two impoverished Vietnamese men by taking them to Quang Ngai to be fitted with artificial limbs at the Quang Ngai Amputees Rehabilitation Center. Both men were single amputees, missing a leg from the knee down. A 14 year old boy from Ky Chanh Village who had been struck in the eye with a stick was taken to the MAG-12 dispensary and then was taken to the 91st Evacuation Hospital for extensive care. The prompt medical treatment received by this boy saved him from almost sure loss of one eye. A Popular Force Corpsman is assigned to the MAG-12 Medcap team from Ly Tin District Headquarters and accompanies the team on every Medcap. This serves two purposes, first to show the villagers that the GVN is trying to help them and secondly to advance the corpsman's training in case the U. S. armed forces were to pull out of country.

The 15th of August a new school year will begin. Many long hours have been spent by the MAG-12 Civic Action Team aiding the villagers in preparing the 16 schools for the coming school year. A sufficient quantity of rocket boxes were delivered to each school to be used in making desks and benches for the students. Black boards have been repaired and repainted and in some instances those beyond repair were replaced with new ones by the team. The biggest percent of supplies required to renovate these schools were supplied by GVN and picked up from Province Headquarters in Tam Ky. The new two room school in Xuan Ngoc Hamlet that was destroyed by the Viet Cong in May has not been rebuilt yet as we have not received the materials to start rebuilding. The Civic Action Officer went to Tam Ky on 30 July to discuss receipt of these building materials with the RD officer. More paper work was required and it was estimated that one week would be the delivery date for these much needed supplies. MAG-12 Civic Action attempts to emphasize self help and assistance to Vietnamese by the GVN.

MAG-12 Civic Action Officer met with the district chief, the PTA and the Headmaster of Ly Tin District High School to discuss the plans on the addition of four new classrooms for the school. The MAG-12 CAO was given the responsibility of project coordinator. The blue prints and material requirements were carefully inspected by SSgt P. T. CONG the MAG-12 interpreter who is a graduate of Saigon University school of architecture. It was discovered that the plans were far too elaborate and the estimate on materials were cut down. The new plans have been completed and materials are being collected. There will be a ceremony the first week of August for laying the corner stone to the new building. The four new classrooms will raise the school from a Junior High School to a Senior High thereby allowing more children to attend providing a higher level of education.

Personal Response lectures were given to approximately 100 Marines from VMA-533 during the month of July. The Civic Action Team of MAG-12 has established excellent relations with the people of Ky Chanh Village and all personal assistance and education projects are warmly received by them.

COMMAND CHRONOLOGY

During August MedCaps were held in Xuan Ngoc, Tien Xuan, Diem Pho, Duc Bo, Ly Tra, Phu Vinh, Dong Thanh and Hoa Xuan. Approximately 1,190 Vietnamese were treated for various illnesses. The largest percentage of treatment needed by the people is in result of scabbies and uncleanliness. The MAG-12 MedCap Team passes out soap and other health items along with the medicine. Due to the concienious effort of the MAG-12 MedCap Team the number of health disorders has been greatly reduced. Marines from VMA-311, VMA-533, VMA-211, and VMA-223 have been very helpful to the MAG-12 Civic Action Team by providing security during the less secure areas during our MedCaps. During the past month, the MAG-12 Group Guard has been providing Marines for added security on the MedCaps. The MAG-12 MedCap Team was on location during the occurance of three accidents on Highway 1. Due to the Medical Corpsman of the MAG-12 Medical Dispensary several lives were saved by their expert knowledge. A Popular Forces Corpsman is assigned to the MAG-12 MedCap Team from the Ly Tin District Headquarters and accompanies the team on every MedCap. This serves two purposes: first, to show the villagers that the GVN is trying to help them and second, to train corpsman in case of a U.S. pullout.

The new school year has already begun. Many long hours have been spent by the MAG-12 Civic Action Team aiding the people. Much paperwork has been completed and supplies which the children need very much to continue their education are now being sent. The MAG-12 Civic Action Team will then be able to supply the children with the materials they need throughout the entire school year. Three-thousand two-hundred and ninety pounds of cement, four-hundred pieces of rebar and 50 pieces of tin were donated by the MAG-12 Civic Action Team for the construction of four additional classrooms at Ly Tin High School and an additional classroom at Ky Chanh High School. On 29 August 1969 Captain Russell was presented the Educational Cultural Medal from the minister of education in a ceremony held in Saigon. On 1 September 1969 Captain Russell was presented the Vietnamese Honor Medal 1st Class for his outstanding services to the people of Viet Nam. Colonel Toan, the Province Chief for Quang Tin presented the medal at a ceremony held at the Province Headquarters in Tam Ky. A personal response lecture was given by Cpl. Bailey to approximately twenty-five SNCC's from MAG-12. The Civic Action Team of MAG-12 has established excellent relations with the people of Ky Chanh Village and all projects are warmly recieved by them.
