1. During July MAG-13 again gained the distinction of being a "composite" MAG with the arrival of VMF(AW)-312, VMFA-115 and administrative control of VMCJ-1. These additions along with VMA-211, represented three different tactical jet aircraft plus transports and jet training aircraft.

VMF(AW)-312 advance party arrived in Iwakuni on 2 July to complete the arrangements for the transfer of the squadron from MAG-11 at NAS Atsugi to MAG-13 at Iwakuni. Aided by the daily logistics support flights provided by H&MS-13's C-54 aircraft, the squadron F8E's were in place at Iwakuni conducting area familiarization flights, conventional ordnance and night GCI training by 11 July. The remainder of the training that month included aerial refueling and advanced section tactics.

VMFA-115 assigned "Phantom" aircraft, arrived at NAS Atsugi and reported ADCON/OPCON to MAG-13 on 5 July, thus becoming MAG-13's third squadron with a unique mission and aircraft. Squadron aircraft were ferried to Iwakuni upon completion of acceptance checks and familiarization flights. LST's and logistic support flights by H&MS-13 aided in moving the remainder of the squadrons personnel and equipment to Iwakuni.

During the month, VMCJ-1 reported for administrative control. The squadron rear was located at Iwakuni, while the remainder of the squadron was divided between Danang, RVN and the team "Yankee" at sea.

VMA-211 departed MCAS Iwakuni with 16 A4E's on 3 July for a non-stop ferry flight to NAS Cubi Point for extensive ordnance training. The aircraft conducted inflight refueling training with KC-130F tankers during the flight. On arrival at Cubi Point, day and night conventional ordnance training was conducted until the last week in July when severe rain storms virtually halted flight training. Ground training of officers and enlisted personnel was conducted in survival, E & E, first aid, and Southeast Asia indoctrination including intelligence briefs. The squadron returned to MCAS Iwakuni on 29 July.

MATCU-66 arrived at MCAS Iwakuni and reported ADCON/OPCON on 20 July and became MAG-13's sixth operational unit.

H&MS-13 began aiding the Shudoin Orphanage in Hiroshima through voluntary contributions of both money and man power. H&MS-13 personnel helped rebuild and refurbish areas of the orphanage while conducting weekly English classes for the orphans.

A program to update and revitalize training concepts within MAG-13 with particular emphasis on physical fitness and weapons training was initiated. The Intelligence Section, aided by personnel recently returned from RVN, conducted initial intelligence briefings for all squadrons on U.S. operations in Southeast Asia.

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MAG-13 provided F4B's, A4E's, and F8E's for a static display at Matsushima and Misawa air bases on 20 July for the 11th Anniversary Aviation Festival. Many thousands of Japanese Nationals observed these displays.

The month of July culminated with MAG-13 rapidly preparing for contingency operations.

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

Cmdr. Jenner is the station's new Catholic chaplain. He replaces Father Robert C. Franklin, who will leave shortly for the 3d Marine Division's Camp Courtney on Okinawa.


Cmdr. Smith rejoins MAG-13 as leader of the group's Protestant members.

Teacher to Ensign. Father Jenner is from MCRD Parris Island, S. C., where he had an 18-mo. tour with the 3d Recruit Training Bn., 6-mos. with the 2d Recruit Training Regt.

He received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1949 from St. Albert the Great Seminary in Oakland, Calif., was ordained two years later at the St. Mary Cathedral, San Francisco. He was then pastor of several churches before he began teaching. Until commissioned a Navy ensign in 1956, Chaplain Jenner was professor of religion and liturgy at Mary Hurst College in Oswego, Ore., and professor of sociology, medical ethics and psychology at Providence Hospital School of Nursing in Portland. He is presently completing post graduate work on his masters degree in history and sociology.

In WWII. Chaplain Smith first joined the Navy as an enlisted man during World War II, fought in the naval battles for Guam, Saipan and Okinawa. He received a Bachelor of Arts degree from Iowa's Wesleyan College and was commissioned an ensign in 1952. In 1954 he attended Garrett Theological Seminary at Northwestern University.

Before joining MAG-13, Cmdr. Smith was stationed at NAS Kingsville, Tex.

1. Preparation for Execution of Assigned Mission

a. Particular Events Related. The joining of VMA-211 and VMFA-115, required briefings to update squadrons to the current situation in Southeast Asia and particularly South Vietnam. These briefings were necessitated by:

(1) Troop and pilot information programs have been oriented to other areas, depending on unit missions, prior to deployment.

(2) Classified intelligence message traffic and information which is routed to units throughout WestPac have not been available to deploying squadrons, by reason of their locations.

(3) Planning and liaison trips remain a requirement for all staff intelligence officers, at all echelons, to adequately prepare deploying units.

b. Experience

(1) The lack of officers in the intelligence field, particularly O202, Lieutenants, has resulted in the assignment of untrained naval aviators to intelligence billets.

(2) Squadrons deploying from Atlantic commands, and not replacing 1st MAW units on a rotational basis, fail to carry required intelligence publications in accordance with ONI 51-2 and CINCPACFLT INST 03840.9. This requires units to order publications upon arrival in WestPac.

1. Reference (a) requested that the capability of MAG-13 to be deployed in 60 to 90 days be examined. In addition, the readiness of WFP(MW)-312 to deploy on 1 September was queried. Reference (b) passed reference (a) to MAG-13 for action. Reference (c) submitted a proposed manning level for MAG-13.

2. The present status of MAG-13 squadrons has been examined in three distinctive areas.

- (a) The squadron's current readiness.
- (b) The squadron's material status.
- (c) Their personnel situation.

The results of this examination are contained in enclosure (1), (2) and (3) along with their projected readiness in 60 to 90 days. In the case of WFP(MW)-312, the terminal date of 1 September 1965 is used.

3. The Group assets and needs were then examined to ascertain capability in the event of deployment to

- a. An expeditionary (S&IS) environment or
- b. A prepared and established air base.

It was felt necessary to study both a. and b. above, as b. carries with it a connotation that such items as fuel dispensing, LOX services, crash crew, etc., would be furnished by agencies anterior to MAG-13. Under these conditions, selected items of equipment and skills would not be mandatory for air operations. These selected items and skills are annotated in enclosures (2) and (3).

1. There does exist critical material and skills shortages within MAG-13. For example, at the present time the Group is short six (6) crash crew vehicles. This is a nonacceptable shortage for operating in an expeditionary deployment, but permits air operations at an established base, such as HHI, Eusemi. The shortage of HHS 6511's on the other hand, is a barrier to deployment at any kind of an air base, HATS or otherwise. Details are contained in enclosures (2) and (3).

2. Reference (a) proposed a manning level that was considered appropriate for MAG-13. Liaison with the 1st MAW T-1 indicates that the personnel shortage is being aggressively prosecuted and no serious bar to deployment is predicted in this area in 60 to 90 days under the assumption this ML will be met. There is one addition in personnel that is not included in reference (a), but is covered in enclosure (3). This is nine MOS 6511's to support JF(AW)-312. Their existing T/O is based on an air to air mission and does not recognize the added air to ground capability. If the 1stMAW assumes the responsibility for supporting JF(AW)-312 with these MOS 6511's, reference remains valid.

3. It was assumed that all classes of supply would be made available to MAG-13, and this is not considered as a factor.

4. The supplies and equipment of Group Supply are currently being restricted. For aircraft other than the F4E, there are no unusual support problems. In view of the fact that all F4E requisitions are Priority 5, and receiving special handling, it is assessed that except for short supply, float controlled items, material will be available by the 60 to 90 day time frame.

5. The following conclusions are reached.

a. MAG-13 can deploy to a prepared air base in 60 to 90 days, assuming the equipment and personnel as listed in enclosures (2) and (3), less those marked with an * are on hand.

5. WSP(AS)-312 will be ready for deployment on 1 September 1965, as the training readiness is completed. To meet the requirements of the air to ground mission, nine (9) M26 6511's are required and equipment as specified in enclosure (2) must be on hand.

SECRETMAG-13 TRAINING STATUS

1. PILOT FLIGHT TRAINING - The pilot training readiness of the three tactical squadrons is adequate to perform both primary and secondary missions within a 60 day period. The following comments apply:

a. WFA-115 - Refresher work is required due to flight inactivity for the past 60 days. Squadron will concentrate on air-air tactics, day/night conventional ordnance delivery.

b. VMA-211 - Present deployment should afford opportunity for squadron to give all pilots experience in all types of conventional delivery both day and night. Continued emphasis on weapons delivery and strike tactics is essential until deployment.

c. VFP(AW)-312 - Squadron is in an excellent state of readiness. Emphasis will be placed on air-ground day/night conventional ordnance delivery.

d. SUMMARY - All squadrons will need to pursue weapons delivery training both day and night. Advanced tactics to include: EDGE, Strikes, CAS and coordinated/aggressed strikes are planned. The greatest influence on the total combat effect of this group will be target availability and ordnance available both of which are now critical.

2. PILOT GROUND TRAINING

a. A pilot ground training syllabus is prepared which provides 20 hours of subject matter related to deployment to RVN. This training plus selected MAATU courses requested for August plus schooling provided on the Sidewinder/Sparrow Missile Systems also scheduled for August should provide all necessary pilot ground training required prior to deployment.

3. BASIC/TECHNICAL TRAINING

a. A comprehensive training program is designed to provide that knowledge specifically required for enlisted personnel deploying to RVN. This program is planned so that it may be accomplished in 60 days.

b. Enlisted ordnance personnel within the Group are scheduled to receive training in August on all areas within their occupational fields where a requirement exists. Eight different courses are now scheduled plus a review on all "EYE" series weapons.

c. Individual squadron technical training provided by experienced personnel now attached should alleviate any training deficiencies caused by the assignment of incoming personnel. This is applicable almost entirely to H&MS and NABS-13.

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d. Physical fitness will be stressed for every individual Marine in this Group.

e. SUMMARY - The only training deficiencies of consequence in MAC-13 within 60 days will be a result of personnel input. This should not pose a major problem.
