2. General Summary

a. MAG-16 supported operations in all TAOR's also the Group supported U. S. Army, U. S. Navy, ROK Marine Corps and ARVN units throughout I Corps.

b. The major enemy effort against MAG-16 units on 3 September when Dong Ha came under artillery attacks. Numerous personnel casualties, equipment casualties, and facility damage occurred.

3. Chronological Summary

1 September - Operations in the Dong Ha and Phu Bai areas were normal. Three HMM-363 UH-34's were hit by enemy fire: one at coord. AT 914888, no injuries; one at coord. AT 948918, no injuries; one at coord. AT 978335, no injuries.

2 September - Dong Ha Airfield came under enemy artillery attack at 1100, 1300, 1345 and 1535. Three UH-34's received minor shrapnel damage,, six personnel were wounded. One VMO-3 UH-1E was hit by enemy fire at coord. XD 911428, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR a mid-air occurred at 020215H involving one UH-34D from HMM-363 and one UH-1E from VMO-2. The UH-34D crashed at AT 975756, four crewmembers received fatal injuries. The UH-1E landed at Danang Air Base, two crewmembers injured.

3 September - Operational commitments in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR were normal. The Combat Base at Dong Ha sustained an enemy artillery attack of an estimated 150 rounds of 152 millimeter artillery. This incoming artillery impacted in an adjacent ammunition storage area causing spontaneous secondary explosions. The combination of the two resulted in the destruction of 32 tropical huts, a 600 man messhall, a chapel, utilities buildings and numerous other facilities and equipment. Additionally forty four tropical huts and the remaining buildings suffered substantial damage. Approximately 50 personnel received wounds of a minor nature, mostly burns and abrasions. Sixteen parked HMM-361 aircraft sustained delta and charlie damage.

4 September - Dong Ha Airfield came under enemy artillery attack at 0734H, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR VMO-2 had five UH-1E's hit by enemy fire. Three received fire at coord. BT 0733 resulting in one aircraft being forced down at coord. BT 076332 and one crewmember receiving major injuries. One UH-1E was hit by enemy fire at coord. BT 097337, no injuries and one UH-1E was hit at coord. BT 112323, no injuries. HMM-363 had two UH-34's hit by enemy fire;

both at coord. BT 076332 resulting in one aircraft being forced down and two crewmembers receiving minor injuries.

5 September - In the Danang TAOR HMM-363 had four UH-34D's hit by enemy fire: one at coord. BT 076256, no injuries; one at coord. BT 075325, no injuries; one at coord. BT 075325, three minor injuries; one at coord. BT 035598, one minor injury. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attack at 1030, 1120 and 1530H, no damage.

6 September - Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attack at 1024 and 1135H, no damage. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR one UH-34D from HMM-363 was hit by enemy fire at BT 035598, no injuries. One CH-53A from HMM-463 was hit by enemy fire at BT 114430, no injuries and one UH-1E from VMO-2 was hit by enemy fire at AT 123330, one crewmember injured.

7 September - In the Dong Ha area one VMO-3 UH-1E was hit by enemy fire at YD 115634, no injuries. In the Phu Bai TAOR two HMM-163 UH-34D's were hit by enemy fire: one at YD 392243, no injuries; one at YD 387367, no injuries. In the Danang TAOR the following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one VMO-2 UH-1E, coord. BT 0938, no injuries; one VMO-2 UH-1E, coord. BT 123330, one injury; one HMM-463 CH-53A, coord. BT 114430, no injury; two HMM-363 UH-34D's, coord. BT 099308, one injury; one VMO-2 UH-1E, coord. BT 141292, no injuries; one HMM-361 UH-34D, coord. BT 130340, no injuries. Two VMO-2 UH-1E's were utilized for CS weapons drop.

8 September - Operations in the Dong Ha area and Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR the following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one O-1C, coord. BT 0927, no injuries; one VMO-2 UH-1E, coord. BT 0828, one injury; one HMM-363 UH-34D, coord. AT 907708, no injuries; one HMM-363 UH-34D, coord. BT 103303, no injuries however the aircraft crashed and was ordered destroyed by 1st MAW. VMO-2 conducted CS weapons drop in support of Operation Swift.

9 September - In the Dong Ha area one UH-34D from HMM-362 was hit by enemy fire resulting in one injury. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR the following aircraft from HMM-363 were hit by enemy fire: one UH-34D, coord. ZC 204486, no injuries; one UH-34D, coord. BT 099308, no injuries; one UH-34D, coord. BT 028597, no injuries.

10 September - In the Dong Ha area one O-1G was hit by enemy fire at coord. YD 113654, no injuries. Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attack at 1820 and 2200H. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR the following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one VMO-2 UH-1E, coord. BT 123324, no injuries; one HMM-363 UH-34D, coord. BT 144368, no injuries.

11 September - In the Dong Ha area the following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one HMM-361 UH-34D, 3 miles NW of Cam Lo, no injuries; one O-1G, coord. YD 113723, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR's were normal.

12 September - In the Dong Ha area two VMO-3 UH-1E's and one HMM-361 UH-34D were damaged by shrapnel during an enemy artillery attack on Dong Ha at 125CH. One WIA resulted from the attack. An HMH-463 CH-53A was hit by enemy fire at coord. YD 1648, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR an HMM-363 UH-34D was hit by enemy fire at coord. BT 152349, no injury.

13 September - Operations were normal in the Danang and Phu Bai TAOR's. Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attack at 0404H, no damage.

14 September - Operations in the Dong Ha area and Danang TAOR were normal. In the Phu Bai TAOR an HMM-362 UH-34D was hit by enemy fire at coord. YC 891978, two injuries.

15 September - Operations were normal in all TAOR'S.

16 September - Operations in the Dong Ha area and Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR, an HMH-463 CH-53A was hit by enemy fire at coord. BT 039679, no injuries.

17 September - Operations in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR's were normal. In the Dong Ha area HMH-463 completed an emergency resupply mission to Con Thien under IFR conditions with the aid of Devastate "D" and TPQ-10 radar.

18 & 19 September - Operations were normal in all TAOR's.

20 September - In the Dong Ha area an HMH-463 CH-53A was hit by enemy fire at coord. YD 221627, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR's were normal.

21 September - In the Dong Ha area an HMM-361 UH-34D was hit by enemy fire at Con Thien, one injury. Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attack at 1100, 1410 and 1810H, no damage. Operations in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR's were normal.

22 September - Operations in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR's were normal. Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attacks seven times. The following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one VMO-3 UH-1E, coord. YD 1369, no injuries; one HMM-362 UH-34D, coord. YD 925103, no injuries.

23 September - Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attacks five times causing minor damage to one VMO-3 UH-1E. A VMO-3 UH-1E was destroyed when it crashed at coord. YD 219638 resulting in three major injuries and one minor injury to crewmembers. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR the following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one VMO-2 UH-1E, coord. BT 1041, no injuries; one HMM-363 UH-34D, coord. BT 1041, no injuries.

24 September - Operations in the Dong Ha area and Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR one HMM-363 UH-34D was hit by enemy fire at coord. AT 9834, no injuries.

25 September - In the Dong Ha area an H&MS-16 O-1C was hit by enemy fire at coord. YD 137565, one fatality. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR the following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one HMM-363 UH-34D, coord. AT 953694, no injuries; two HMH-463 CH-53A's; one 22 miles S of Danang, no injuries; one at unknown location, no injuries.

26 September - Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attack at 2005 and 2025H, no damage. Operations in the Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR one H&MS-16 O-1C was hit by enemy fire at coord. AT 985533, no injuries.

27 September - In the Dong Ha area one VMO-3 UH-1E was hit by enemy fire at coord. YD 111673, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR's were normal although hampered slightly by inclement weather in the afternoon.

28 September - Operations in the Dong Ha area and Phu Bai TAOR were normal. In the Danang TAOR the following aircraft were hit by enemy fire: one HMH-463 CH-53A, coord. AT 910538, no injuries; one HMM-363 UH-34D coord. AT 997785, no injuries.

29 September - Dong Ha came under enemy artillery attack at 0645H causing minor damage to one HMM-361 UH-34D. One HMH-463 CH-53A was hit by enemy fire at coord. YD 147615, no injuries. Operations in the Phu Bai and Danang TAOR's were normal.

30 September - Operations in all TAOR's were normal.

4. Civic Action

a. Medical. A total of 22 sick calls were held by MAG-16 medical personnel, treating 1675 patients. MCB-133 medical personnel treated 607 patients. MCB-7 medical personnel treated 1303 patients. At Station Hospital 517 patients were treated, 67 Vietnamese civilians were admitted as beneficiaries of the Civic Action Program, 31 were major surgery cases and 110 were treated as out-patients. The neurosurgeon performed 10 operations at ARVN hospital. The ophthalmologist treated 126 patients at Station Hospital. A team of two corpsman treated 3,067 patients and administered 167 immunizations. The preventive medicine section of the USNH was made available to the Ministry of Health in Hue, RVN for eight days at the request of CORDS Health Director. The section administered approximately 20,000 immunizations with the hypo-jet injector apparatus as well as training Vietnamese health workers in the use and maintenance of this equipment.

b. Dental. The Dental section treated 257 patients.

c. The rodent control and insecticide fogging programs continue.

d. Education. MAG-16 held 4 hours of English instruction for 365 students. MCB-7 held 270 hours of English instruction for 434 students.

e. Projects. MAG-16 held a Childrens Mid-Autumn Festival in Son Thuy for 750 children. MCB-133 painted the Civic Action Center and installed a pump in the Son Thuy hamlet well. In addition, 3 houses in the hamlet were repaired.

f. Giveaway. MAG-16 donated 1600 packs for Childrens Day to Son Thuy and orphanages in the MAG-16 area. Two rice threshing machines were given to Son Thuy along with instruction in their use. 800 pounds of food and 2 loads of scrap lumber were donated to the new leprosarium. 5th Comm. Bn. donated 25 bags of cement to the Damon hamlet and donated clothing to the Stella Maris Orphanage. MCB-133 distributed 270 pounds of clothing, 162 pounds of food and 129 bars of soap to the Son Thuy hamlet and donated \$150.00 U.S. each to the WEC Orphanage and Saint Mary's Orphanage. MCB-7 is presently paying the tuition for 50 children to attend school. In addition, they donated 4,800 pounds of garbage for livestock food, 2 galley stoves and 165 gallons of diesel fuel to the WEC orphanage.

g. Government. A meeting of all Civic Action Officers, Village Chiefs and Hamlet chiefs was held at MMAF.

h. Summary. A 16X60 strongback tent will be put up as an addition to the Sacred Heart School and MCB-7 will dig a large 1,000 foot drainage ditch to prevent the new refugee village from being flooded by rains.

During the month of September, MAG-16 flew 10,240 hours, experiencing the usual enemy antiaircraft fire incidents and resulting damage to aircraft. 205 fire incidents were reported, 39% of which were hits, resulting in 50.4 flight hours per fire incident and 129.1 flight hours per aircraft hit. Aircraft crews submitted 66 spot reports for 156.5 flight hours per report.

MAG-16 installation at Dong Ha, RVN received enemy artillery fire, particularly during the first week of the month, resulting in damage to aircraft, facilities and structures.

10. Motor Transport. During the month of September, the MMAF Motor Transport Section traveled 80,395 miles, the section hauled 1,444,575 gallons of water, 29,800 gallons of MOGAS, 62,400 gallons of diesel fuel, 3,335 gallons of aircraft oil, 98,400 gallons of JP fuel, 2,406 short tons of cargo and transported 56,222 passengers. The Phu Bai/Dong Ha Section traveled 30,017 miles, hauled 369,000 gallons of water, 50,472 gallons of fuel, 2,375 gallons of aircraft oil, 156 short tons of cargo and transported 65,535 passengers.

13. Base Operations. Base Operations continued to support tenant squadrons and visiting aircraft utilizing the airfields at MMAF, Phu Bai, Dong Ha and Khe Sanh. A total of 84 aircraft revetments were constructed from more than 7,000 barrels.

14. Weather Service. The weather section supported all MAG-16 flight operations in I Corps during September.

15. Food Services

a. MMAF. There were approximately 216,555 meals fed during the month. Bakery products utilized approximately 24,000 pounds of flour.

b. Phu Bai. There were approximately 63,059 A-ration and 3,062 B-ration meals served during the month.

c. Dong Ha. The mess hall at Dong Ha was destroyed by enemy artillery attacks and at present hot coffee and C-rations are being served at the Dong Ha Base Chapel. Hot meals are being provided for personnel in the 9th Marines mess hall.

16. Base Development/Utilities

a. Water Point. The water point personnel processed 1,444,575 gallons of water during the month 85,600 gallons of which were non-potable.

b. Paint Shop. The paint shop personnel completed twenty-two projects. A total of fifty signs were painted.

c. Electric Shop. Electric shop personnel completed forty-four projects and numerous trouble calls.

d. Plumbing Shop. Plumbing shop personnel completed twenty-two work requests and numerous trouble calls.

e. Refrigeration Shop. Refrigeration personnel completed fourteen trouble calls.

f. Carpenter Shop. Carpenter shop personnel completed forty-seven trouble calls.

g. Generator Shop. During the month, generator shop personnel performed all first and second echelon maintenance with a minimum of breakdown.

h. Laundry. During the month, the Base Laundry processed 21,155 pounds of clothing.

i. Progress Report for Phu Bai and Dong Ha. During the month, the Utility Section at Dong Ha was primarily engaged in clearing away operations and salvaging equipment and materials after enemy artillery attacks. At Phu Bai, continuous improvement and development progressed.

17. Exchange. During the month of September, exchange sales were \$61,363.00. Sales for James S. Lee were \$2,459.80 and \$1,321.20 for Seaham Photo Service.

18. Ordnance. On 3 September the ammunition supply point at Dong Ha was destroyed by enemy artillery attacks. During the month the Ordnance Section issued 617,000 rounds of small arms ammunition, 3,820 rounds of 2.75 white phosphorus and high explosive rockets and over 4 tons of assorted chemical and smoke agents.

20. Communications

a. The re-cabling of MMAF was completed and the cut over to the new cable was completed. Dong Ha and Phu Bai continued to improve their wire communications.

b. Radio communications was marginal during the month. Phu Bai was without power to operate their radios for 25 days however since radio serves as a backup for telephone, no loss of efficiency was realized.

c. Message traffic was higher during the period due to an increase of almost 40% of message traffic originated by MAG-16. Total volume of messages processed was 6,001 with 2,170 originated by MAG-16. Down time experienced by the message center was reduced by 50% due to relocation and the installation of air conditioning.
