

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

In October of 1843 Bishop Frederick Baraga purchased an old warehouse from Pierre Crebassa, a L'Anse fur trader, for the sum of forty dollars. Dismantling the warehouse, Baraga had the logs transported from the east shore of Keweenaw Bay to the west shore, directly across the bay from the Methodist mission. Baraga had previously purchased approximately five hundred acres of land at Assinins for the mission, most of which he later turned over to the Indians.

With this modest beginning, a structure of simple design, twenty feet wide and seventy-two feet long, was erected. Although the interior of the church was not yet finished, the first mass was celebrated on June 16, 1844. Both the worship area and the presbytery were located under the one roof. Baraga moved into his quarters in June of 1844, and the building was completed. This church was destroyed in 1873, and a larger church was built by Father Gerhard Terhorst, which was also destroyed some years later.


The original school building, erected in 1860 under the guidance of Bishop Baraga and Father Edward Jacker, still stands and has been used recently as a warehouse. The large stone building to the west of the schoolhouse was used as both a convent and as orphanage quarters. The eastern wing of the stone building was built by Father Terhorst in 1866, in preparation for the arrival of the Sisters of St. Joseph. The extension to the west was added in 1877 to make room for the first girl boarders.

Under the direction of Father Casper Douenberg, chaplain of the orphanage from 1916 to 1936, a larger building was constructed just south of the old convent and orphanage in 1929. This building, costing \$125,000, was used as an orphanage until the purchase of the property by the Province of St. Joseph of the Capuchin Order in the late 1950s.

In 1957 all of the orphanage buildings were rededicated as Sacred Heart Friary and were used as the novitiate of the Capuchin Fathers in the midwest until the late 1960s.

The property presently owned by the Capuchin Fathers includes the entire mission area and all remaining buildings and is presently in the process of being sold. Just north of the mission area lies the Holy Name Parish Cemetery, resting place for native parishioners, priests and nuns. Buried here, in land long held by the Chippewa tribe, are many of the dedicated chaplains of the Assinins mission and orphanage, including Father Gerhard Terhorst, Monsignor Melchior Faust, Father John Henn, and Father Anthony Vermare. The cemetery dates to the mid-1860s. Less than five acres, the cemetery of Holy Name Parish was part of the original acreage deeded by Bishop Baraga to Chief Edward Assinins and his band following the Civil War. Simple wooden crosses mark the graves of Indians and missionaries alike.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

For three years Father Frederic Baraga, missionary at La Pointe, western Lake Superior, received letters from Pierre Crebassa, a fur trader, asking Baraga to visit L'Anse. Crebassa was conveying the request of Chief Bineshi and other members of the Chippewa tribe who were not satisfied with the Methodist mission there. The dissenting Indians had moved to the western coast of Keweenaw Bay and had established their homes there.

In the spring of 1843 Baraga decided to begin his labors among the L'Anse Indians. He remained at L'Anse for three weeks, christened thirty Indians, and preached. Crebassa had arranged part of his house for use as a chapel and school.

Baraga returned to L'Anse again on October 24, 1843, determined to establish a permanent mission. He began to build, with the help of his Indian converts and some individuals from La Pointe, a log church with a presbytery, and a school. Using cedar logs from an old warehouse sold to him by Crebassa, Baraga's church went up, and the first mass was celebrated on June 16, 1844, with the interior of the building yet unfinished. Baraga moved into the rooms in the back of the church, and the building was dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus on September 29, 1844. In an attempt to settle the Indians around the church building, Baraga purchased 496.70 acres of land and erected fifteen log houses. The following summer, seven more were built.

While laboring at L'Anse, Father Baraga wrote his most noted Indian works, the Chippewa grammar and the Chippewa dictionary. Using L'Anse as his base, he also made numerous journeys, visiting in Michigan, Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Ontario. In 1854, Baraga was made Vicar Apostolic of Upper Michigan and visited L'Anse for the first time as bishop in September of that year.

Following the outbreak of the Civil War, Baraga and the L'Anse Indians became apprehensive about rumours supporting the consolidation of Indian tribes on reservations. To prevent this, Baraga conveyed to Chief Edward Assinins and his band all the mission land, including the cemetery adjacent to the mission school, save the fourteen acres which were to include the Catholic church, the church being the center of the fourteen-acre square.

Father Edward Jacker was sent to L'Anse in 1855 where he labored until 1861, replaced by Father Gerhard Terhorst. Father Terhorst used the old church and other facilities, including the small school built in 1860.

8.1 Significance (continued)

Terhorst arranged for the Sisters of St. Joseph to operate the school. Three sisters traveled by canoe from Sault Ste. Marie to L'Anse with Father Jacker and Father Terhorst. The Sisters taught the Indian children of Assinins until 1906 when the Sisters of St. Agnes of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin, took charge of the orphanage and school. Several of the Sisters of St. Joseph were buried in the mission cemetery bordering the school grounds.

Under Father Terhorst's guidance the school was enlarged, and an orphan asylum for boys was established. By the time of his death in 1901, he had been instrumental in erecting several houses of worship in the Keweenaw Bay area and had labored diligently to improve the school begun by Bishop Baraga. Father Terhorst was also buried in the mission cemetery, laid to rest among the people with whom he had worked for forty years. More priests to the Assinins mission were buried in years later near the dedicated Terhorst. The new orphanage building was erected in 1929, south of the old orphanage building and the cemetery, to accomodate further children at the Assinins mission.

The orphanage and school were in operation until 1956, when they were closed due to diocesan reorganization and centralization in Marquette. The orphanage buildings were rededicated on March 26, 1957, as Sacred Heart Friary and were used by the Capuchin Fathers until the late 1960s. In December of 1971 the Midwest Capuchin Province of St. Joseph, following attempts to sell the Assinins property, decided to transfer the buildings and land to the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community. Father Rupert Dorn, Provincial of the Midwest Capuchins, expressed the desire of the Province to return the buildings to the Indians for whom the original mission had been built, as a conscious attempt to practice social justice. The Indian community at Assinins, who settled there with Baraga's assistance during the nineteenth century, will utilize the buildings at the former friary as headquarters for the Tribal Council, for a cultural enrichment program, and an alcoholic rehabilitation center. Thus the mission area will once again become the focal point for Indian life and activity on the Keweenaw Bay.

The L'Anse area, since the 1660s, had been an important base for the Ottawa and Chippewa tribes and for fur traders and explorers in the region. Baraga's labors here drew praise from many parts of the world, especially from Vienna, Rome, and Paris. His success at L'Anse was well noted by his fellow priests and by the pope. From the mission at L'Anse, Baraga rose to the position of first Bishop of the Upper Michigan, earning an important place in both the secular and religious histories of the Lake Superior region.




