

SENIORS OF '39 turning back four years to their first year at Chilocco find that in the freshman year the class elected Clarence Cravatt for president. Looking at the next two years of the class history shows that Rex Riddle was sophomore president, and Overton Washington, junior president.

Every class boasts of the honors that have been won by its members to bring distinction to the individual and to the group. One such honor in the Class of '39 is the intra-mural championship won by the girls as juniors in 1938. The plaque given to the winners now hangs in the Chilocco Library.

Boys and girls who have represented different groups in a special way were Virginia Scritchfield, with her charm and grace, as Chilocco's Arkallah Queen in 1938; Clarence Cravatt as representative of the Chilocco B. Y. P. U. to the national convention held at Memphis, Tennessee; Elliott Howe, as radio guest of the Good Year Farm News program to tell of Chilocco over the NBC hook-up originating in Kansas City, Missouri.

The junior-senior prom brought out Ahniwake Miller as the prom queen, and for the first time a change was made in the tradition and Oswald Parton was the prom king and the official escort of the queen.

STUDENT COUNCIL '38 - '39

THE CHILOCCO STUDENT COUNCIL

IN FEBRUARY 1936 a group of farsighted group leaders and their advisers met and formed what is today the Chilocco Student Council, or the "Voice of the Students". This organization was permanently installed in the school only after experimenting with different student group meetings beginning in 1931.

The personnel of the Council consists of eighteen members, nine boys and nine girls selected by the students to represent each of the classes and each of the Student Homes. These members are selected in May so that the Student Council membership will be established in the fall at the beginning of the new school year and they may in that way start functioning without delay.

The personnel of the 1938-1939 Council consists of Clarence Cravatt, president; Ora Lee Chuculate, president of girls' council; Jack Bushyhead, vice president of joint Council; Pauline Stites, vice president of girls' council; Lorene Canafax, secretary of the councils; other members, Ramona Jenkins, Ruby Mae Harrison, Ethel Mae Coleman, Irene Griffin, Bernice Whitmire, Birdie Higner, Elliott Howe, Levi Hall, Beaman Sam, Thomas Fields, Ernest Childers, and William Biggs.


Regular meetings of the Student Council are scheduled on the school calendar for the first and third Thursday evenings of each month. This year a mimeographed copy of the official minutes has been distributed to every faculty member. Faculty members have a standing invitation to meet with the Council and present their side of any problem.

The 1938-1939 Council also drew up a written constitution which they plan to present to the students for adoption by the Student Council.

Besides stating the students' point of view on all school issues, helping to promote higher standards of living and ideals, and promoting student leadership, the group usually finds time to enter Chilocco social life each year with a students' amateur hour, a group leaders' party, and other assemblies and entertainments.





VARSITY teams in basket ball, football and boxing for the past four years have had many senior boys in the membership. Intra-mural sports during 1938—1939 encouraged many more boys to take part in athletics and to later become members of the varsity teams. Baseball, boxing, and basket ball, horse shoe pitching, tennis, soft ball and badminton were the sports engaged in. The first intra-murals were the baseball games in the fall of 1938 which resulted in championship for the senior boys who were members of the 12 y and z sections. In boxing intra-murals two championships were won by senior boys, Curtis Elam and Oswald Parton. Basket ball intra-mural tournament resulted in another victory for the senior team.

The senior girls of the class of '39 have also won honors in their intra-murals. The senior basket ball team, "Old Maids," clashed in the final game with the sophomore "Braves," and lost by a score of 19 to 25. The senior girls were victorious in the volley ball tournament. As juniors in 1938 the girls won a medal for having the winning teams during the year, and they have high hopes of being the winner of the greatest number of points during the year of 1938—1939, and again winning a trophy.


TROPHIES



THE FORTY-SIX trophies in the display case in the school library tell a story of activities engaged in since 1914. Not all the trophies are athletic awards but most of them are. Inter-class field and track, and basket ball were the first sports to be honored with awards in 1914. From 1914 to 1937 the awards were made for the best Indian School Exhibit in 1919; inter-class field and track in 1921 and 1922; baseball and Oklahoma meet in 1924; inter-class field and track in 1925; debate team in 1926; athletic meet in Oklahoma 1928; six trophies in 1928 for military drill, inter collegiate relays, agriculture meet; music award in 1929; basket ball and baseball 1930 and the same in 1931; trophies for boxing from 1932 to 1937; six undated trophies for cross country run, and baseball; intra-mural sports for girls in 1937, a wall plaque won by the girls of Class '39.
