



Fifty-eight seniors have persisted in staying with their course at Chilocco Agricultural School to graduate with the Class of 1943. The call to the armed services, and defense work has taken a heavy toll from the class membership. As freshmen, there were one hundred and eighty members.

Robert Billings will be remembered as the president during the freshmen year of this class. After Company C of the 180th Infantry, National Guards was mobilized in September 1940, the class elected its sophomore president, Andrew Walker, to replace Robert.

As Juniors of '42 and '43 the class elected J. A. Mills for Class President, with Raymond Isaac to assist him as Vice President. Reba Faye Nadeau made a capable secretary, and from her class minutes we see that, "We worried about Consumer Education, Rural Sanitation, and the Prom." Lucille Elam, a classmate who left her class for defense work was the choice of the class for Prom Queen. The class was proud to have the Football Queen chosen from its ranks. Louella Gritts had this honor, but she too left her class to work, before her senior year.

Reducing the size of the class has emphasized their leadership. Nine boys have lettered in one or more sports. Since Varsity teams were "frozen for the duration" intra-mural tournaments have become the order of the day. In the shuffle board and basketball tournaments the senior girls led with the highest number of points. The Fall Play Day gave the seniors a defeat of only one point below the winning Juniors, the score being 117 to 116.

The patriotic essay contest was won by a senior girl, Mildred Jackson. The Sunday School Executive Committee is made up entirely of seniors. They are Lucy Wade, Alice Collins, Emma Belle Scott, Raymond Isaac, Edmund McCurtain, and Jack LeClair. Their duties have included planning programs, securing speakers, managing contests, and also encouraging attendance.

More of the "Forward ever" spirit is shown by other senior leaders. There is Jaunita Kennedy president of the Y.W.C.A., Raymond Isaac, president of the Student Council, and a number of senior boys acting as Group Leaders in the student homes for the younger boys. The part of the leading lady in the operetta "Her Royal Highness, Miss Jones" was earned by a senior, Lila Jo Keel.

It is a tradition that the Senior Class should take the initiative in leadership both in the classroom and in extra-curricular fields. The Class of 1943 feel that their Class History speaks for them.



The 1942-43 Student Council has carried on the work begun in previous years, trying to give students a democratic share in solving student problems. Activities for the past year have emphasized the need for well planned student recreation. The Council has shared in sponsoring co-recreational dancing during mid-week to teach beginners. On alternate Saturday evenings they have volunteered to be responsible for planning and organizing games for the entertainment of younger students or for those not caring to dance.

Other activities have included sponsoring a lecture on boy-girl relationships, encouraging respect to the American Flag in observing retreat, sponsoring the annual Amateur Hour, and assisting in organization of the Victory Corps. In general the aim of the Student Council has been to develop proper school spirit, to encourage leadership, and to aid in a closer relationship between students and instructors.


